Bill's Reflections

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you..."

But Thomas, one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe."

A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." - John 20:19-29

In this well known passage, Jesus says to his disciple Thomas: "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe."

Traditionally we have interpreted Jesus as scolding Thomas. He wouldn't believe Jesus was alive unless he saw it with his own eyes. Therefore—the story goes—we should try to have faith that doesn't require proof. Faith that just trusts and believes.

But, I don't think that's what Jesus is doing here. The phrasing of his statement here echoes a well known part of his sermon on the mount (the Beatitudes). In the Beatitudes, Jesus highlights a variety of traits and behaviors that mark people as blessed in God's kingdom. Jesus is telling us that faith is more than words. It is more than knowledge or belief. Faith is about action.

As a faith, community this is our challenge today. We are called to put our faith in action. We are called to make our community a place where people can know and experience God.

The events of that first Easter are lost to history. Jesus is no longer with us in the flesh, but his spirit—the same spirit he breathed on the disciples in that locked room—remains.

And every time we come together:
as a congregation for morning worship
as a small group for Bible Study
as a team to serve at the Community Soup Kitchen
as a pair of deacons visiting one of our homebound
members

even as friends around the dinner table

Every time we come together, that same spirit is present in our midst...

But more often than not, this does more harm than good...

This story teaches us how essential our faith community is to creating a deep and lasting peace. In the midst of their grief, the disciples have gathered to support one another. They each bring something different into that space, and together—as a community—their faith creates a space where God can be felt and experienced in a unique way.

Thomas presents us not with a picture of doubt and skepticism, but with a passionate certainty that there is more to faith than kind words and heartfelt prayers. As we said last week—Resurrection is not a one time event that happened in a tomb outside of Jerusalem a long time ago. Resurrection is an ongoing event. In every moment, God is inviting new life and new possibility.

In every person, every place and every thing God has created.... resurrection is endless.

And each of us is invited to be a part of it.

Thomas knows this, and that's why he wants to see Jesus. He knows that God is really risen and really out there continuing to make resurrection happen in our world.

It takes a community to nurture faith like this.

It takes a community to hold this faith when tragedy strikes.

And it takes a community to put faith like this to work—creating a peace that passes all understanding...

My prayer is that we can continue to make our community a place where this peace is found and experienced—a place where we can celebrate with one another in our happiest moments and support one another in our most challenging times.

Hymn of the Month

Christ Has Risen While Earth Slumbers

Author: John L. Bell (b. 1949)

First Published: The Child's Book of Praise

(Glasgow, 1988)

This is a text both reflective and challenging. It begins on a remorseful note about the failure of human beings to believe and trust in Christ. In our own ways, we have been doubters and deniers like Thomas and Peter. So the cosmos is summoned to proclaim the Resurrection. The second stanza is a catalog of those for whom Christ has risen, a welcome change from the customary hymnic attention to those for whom Christ died. The final stanza adds to this list the remarkable lines about "all whose lives are messed or mangled, all who find religion strange." And why would Christ do such a thing? To make us, like him, "evidence of transformation in which God is known and seen." It is hard to imagine a better explication of what it means to be a Christian, literally "a little Christ."

A solo melody instrument could be used effectively here to establish the melody by playing through the tune (accompanied or not) as an introduction and by possibly returning on the final stanza for a descant. The vitality of the tune will be greatly enhanced if the dotted and syncopated rhythms are carefully observed.

While this text could well be used on any Sunday of the Easter season, it seems to have the most affinities with Easter 2, when the RCL always appoints the Thomas story from *John* 20. This text is a helpful reminder that Christ's Resurrection was inclusive, while the church has too often been exclusive.

Joyful is the dark, holy hidden God. rolling cloud of night beyond all naming: majesty in darkness, energy of love, word in flesh, the mystery proclaiming.

Joyful is the dark, Spirit of the deep, winging wildly o'er the world's creation, silken sheen of midnight plumage black and bright,

swooping with the beauty of a raven.

Joyful is the dark, shadowed stable floor; angels flicker, God on earth confessing, as with exultation, Mary, giving birth, hails the infant cry of need and blessing.

Joyful is the dark, coolness of the tomb, waiting for the wonder of the morning; never was that midnight touched by dread and gloom:


darkness was the cradle of the dawning.

We are asking for your help to keep our utilities costs under control. Utilities represent one of the larger line items in the B&G budget, and with that in mind we have programmed all thermostats in our buildings to achieve maximum efficiency.

There are separate thermostats for heating and cooling in each building. These can be manually adjusted, but we ask that if you do so, please DO NOT push the hold button after you have changed the setting. This will allow the system to return to its normal program after a given time frame.

Thermostat Locations:

Sanctuary: Thermostat in the Sanctuary controls all heat. Thermostat on balcony controls all air conditioning.

Chorba Hall Main Floor: Thermostat by the stairs controls all heat on main floor

Thermostats in Library and Main Hall control air conditioning on main floor

Chorba Hall 2nd Floor: Thermostat in Conference Room controls all heat on 2nd floor. Thermostat outside bathroom controls all air conditioning on 2nd floor

Chorba Hall Basement: Thermostat outside big front room controls all heat for basement. Thermostat on right in hallway controls air conditioning in music room and 1/2 of piano room. Thermostat on left in hallway controls air conditioning in 1/2 of piano room and all front rooms.
