# Robert's Reflections

Dear Friends.

We have entered the season of Lent. The word Lent came into use in the Middle Ages when sermons and worship made use of the language of common people instead of Latin. Lent meant *spring;* (in German: *Lenz*). It also came from a Germanic root for "long" because in spring, days lengthen says Wikipedia.

Lent has traditionally been the time for believers to prepare themselves with prayer, repentance, and even self-denial, the height of which comes in Holy Week with the Last Supper (Maundy Thursday) and the crucifixion (Good Friday). Lent is a time of testing and temptation. Jesus spent 40 days in the wilderness, where the gospels tell us he was tested by the devil. As with anything you deny yourself, and then later enjoy, Lent finally prepares us to celebrate the joy of Easter.

As a minister, I take all things seriously: preaching, worship, pastoral care, for example. Yet for reasons I cannot explain, I have had many occasions here, and serving God and you at this church, to laugh. So along our Lenten way—even under the clouds of darkness over Syria, of the greatest refugee crisis the world has seen, of tough economic times, of the name calling among political candidates, the news of denominations in decline, and the personal trials some of us are facing with health issues—there is time not only for confession and soul searching, but laughter. Here's a Lenten/ Easter story I find humorous but also inspiring, about a man who knew dark and difficult times.

Winston Churchill planned his own funeral service; it took place in St. Paul's Cathedral, London. Churchill included great hymns of the church and eloquent Anglican liturgy. At his direction, he also planned to have a bugler positioned high in the dome of St. Paul's playing "Taps" at the end of the service, that song that says the day is over but is also the mournful reminder of the end of a life, eternal rest.

But then came a dramatic turn in the service. By written instruction, he had another bugler placed on the other side of the great cathedral. As soon as the last tones of "Taps" faded, the second bugler immediately played the notes for "Reveille" —"It's time to get up! It's time to get up! It's time to get up in the morning!" That second bugle call was Churchill's testimony of faith, shared with those he knew would be mourning his death, declaring at the end of this life, and the end of history, the last note will not be "Taps" but "Reveille!"

The empty tomb is what we celebrate at Easter, the assurance that God has the final word, not death, but life. "Thanks be to God, " Paul said, "who gives us the victory, through our Lord Jesus Christ." We are Easter people.

## **Session Committees**

**CLERK OF SESSION:** The primary role of the Clerk of Session is to maintain and preserve the records of the church, including the minutes of Session and Congregational Meetings and the Rolls and Registers. They may assist the moderator in docket preparation. Clerk: Tom MacCowatt

**ADMINISTRATION/COMMUNICATIONS:** Responsible for our insurance policies, use of building policies, office management, and phone and office equipment contracts, technology and other aspects of the administration of the Church. Chair: Caroline Ford

**ADULT EDUCATION:** Responsible for programs to instruct adults in faith and life application through Bible study, guest speakers, and discussion groups throughout the year. Chair: Julia Buteux

**BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS:** Care and maintenance of the church buildings and property. Interim Chair: Don Vellekamp

**CONGREGATIONAL LIFE:** Fellowship is an important part of the life of the Church. This group takes the lead in planning and supervising dinners, picnics, and special events throughout the year. Chair: Meg Richardson

**FINANCE:** Responsible for the formulation of a budget, the monitoring of income and spending, investments, and the reporting of the Church's financial status to Session and the congregation. The leader of this committee is the Treasurer. Chair: Keith Wood

**MEMBERSHIP:** Responsible for care of current members, recruitment of new members, and the keeping of an accurate roll of membership. Chair: Jane O'Keeffe

**MISSION AND OUTREACH:** The Church accepts responsibility to care for those beyond our doors. This committee is responsible for the allocation of mission funds to organizations in our community and throughout the world. They are also involved in the interpretation of our mission to the congregation. Chair: Jonathan Shelby

**NOMINATING:** Each year this committee is responsible for choosing candidates to serve as elders and deacons as well as other corporate officers for the Church. Chair: Tom MacCowatt

**PERSONNEL:** Responsible for hiring, monitoring, and evaluating the paid staff of the Church. Chair: Carol Conger Vellekamp

**STEWARDSHIP:** Leads the campaign to interpret our mission as a church and encourages faithful giving by members of the congregation through the pledge process. Chair: Todd Claytor

**WORSHIP AND MUSIC:** The planning and monitoring of worship services, communion and baptisms, the choir and other musical programs in the Church are the responsibility of this group. Chair: Peter Saulnier

**YOUTH EDUCATION:** Plans and monitors the Church's Confirmation Class, Sunday School, and Youth Ministry. Chair: Kerra French





Guest Preacher & Speaker: Sunday, April 3 Rev. Larissa Kwong Abazia

## **Does America Have a Coherent Foreign Policy?**

More than one political pundit has made the observation that ever since the end of the Cold War in 1990, the United States has struggled to determine what its role in the world should be, that we have no grand strategy nor coherent foreign policy. But others have pointed out that grand strategy in the post Cold War world is difficult, if not impossible, to create. The system is far too complicated and constantly morphing.

### **DOUGLAS W. SIMON**

Dr. Simon, emeritus professor of political science at Drew, specialized in international affairs, U.S. foreign policy, international organization, and national security. After receiving a B.A. from Willamette University in 1963, he served as an officer in U.S. Air Force intelligence, including a tour in Vietnam. He earned a Ph.D. at the University of Oregon. Arriving at Drew in 1971, Dr. Simon co-directed the University's Semester on the United Nations for 15 years, served as convener of its Masters in International Affairs Program, and later chaired the political science department. He is the only two-time recipient of Drew's Distinguished Teaching Award. He coauthored *The Challenge of Politics*, now in its fifth edition, and *New Thinking and Developments in International Politics*. Dr. Simon has contributed to such publications as the *Harvard Journal of World Affairs*, *East Asian Survey, Comparative Political Studies*, and *Perspectives on the Holocaust*.

Brid Nicholson March 13, 11:15 am

Brid Nicholson, Associate Professor of History at Kean University, will participate in the *Sunday Speaker Series* on March 13 at 11:15 am in the library. Her timely topic is *A History of St. Patrick*. Although St. Patrick's Day is widely celebrated, few appear to know anything about the man. Who was he, and why is a Welshman the Patron Saint of Ireland? Fill in the blanks as Dr. Nicholson tells the story of Patrick, the Irish, and the creation of the Celtic Catholic Church.



A native of Dublin, Dr. Nicholson teaches Irish, American, and Middle Eastern history; she received the Ph.D. from Drew in 2006. She coordinates the Internship Program at Kean through which students experience history in archives, museums, and stately homes across the region. We look forward to what promises to be a lively and informative talk.


