Rick's Reflections

"Jesus asked them, "Who do you say that I am?" Simon Peter answered, "You are the Christ, the son of the living God." And Jesus answered him, "Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah. For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father in heaven. And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church."

~ Matthew 16: 15-18

I was at a preaching conference last week. Much of the conversation was about the emerging church movement. I am still not sure exactly what that means. But it is clear that there is a major change taking place in our culture when it comes to church. And while I think too much was made of the demise of the mainline churches, there was some encouragement about a renewal of interest in church on the part of younger believers. I think it is up to us to see this not as a threat, but as a sign of hope that God is doing a new thing.

One of the primary marks of the emerging church is that it is not "anti." It is not building its identity on what it is against. So it is not anti-science or anti-gay or anti-change or anti-other faiths.

So what does an emerging church look like? It is open and affirming of all of God's people regardless of the way they choose to approach God. The emerging church does not give up the foundations of being followers of Christ. They built their identity on the strong model of Jesus rather than on what things they are against. They are not judgmental of others. They use the Bible as a liberating message of ultimate love rather than using it as a weapon or a tool to condemn others. In the emerging church, there is an emphasis on granting permission to question things and being in communion even when you are not sure about everything.

What really surprised me was that many of these qualities are already evident in our mainline Presbyterian Church. We are like Peter. We are the rock that people need. Jesus is the Christ, the son of the living God. But we are also rocky sometimes. And change is hard sometimes. God is patient with us. God is working to rebuild our identity based on Jesus and not on what we are against. Peter was rocky throughout the gospel story. But eventually he gets it and really becomes the rock. Now we are doing the same thing with God's help. We are all, in a sense, emerging into what God is calling us to be. On Christ the solid rock I stand, all other ground is sinking sand.

MAY SESSION HIGHLIGHTS



The following are highlights from the May 21, 2013 Session Meeting. The meeting began with Anne LaPré reading devotions.

Committee Highlights

Adult Education: June Tamburro's program on Prison Ministry has been rescheduled for October 27th. Programs for the fall include Frankenstein's Cat, which raises moral questions about transgenic species. Pastor Sweeney and Amada Tsukamoto will present a program on Hymns and Their History on September 15th after worship.

Congregational Life: June 2nd is Confirmation Sunday. Please join the Confirmands and their families at Coffee Hour for a celebratory treat. The Committee is hard at work planning the church picnic scheduled for June 9th at 4:00. A very big Thank You goes to the Sheeleighs for offering the use of their home once again!

Membership: The new membership section of the website has been submitted for posting—thanks to Anne Talcott: Some new programs are in the work for our church members. The Men's Breakfast Group has recently started to meet on Tuesday mornings at 7:30 at the Minute Man—all are welcome. Suggestions gathered at the Listening Sessions will be published in *The Pipe Organ*. The next new members' class will meet on June 9th.

Youth Education: The Blitz Build held on May 18th and 19th was a big success. Many of our young and adult members were able to assist in building a home on Budd Lake for a single mother and her two children. The house was completed in just two days! More opportunities for our congregants to participate in a traditional Habitat for Humanity project will be coming up on June 8th and 22nd.

Worship and Music: There was a tribute to the choir on May 19th during worship. The Committee is still in the process of interviewing for a new choir director. A heartfelt Thank You to Richard Cox for sharing his gifts with us over these past 16 years! He will be greatly missed!

Mission and Outreach: Kirkridge, a Christian retreat and study center, and the Mental Health Association of Morris County are two non-profits that have been added to the list of organizations for which we provide assistance. We have distributed a total of \$33,000 in funds to the 12 non-profits we support.

Buildings and Grounds: There are plans under way to paint Fellowship Hall; the Committee is currently researching the options. The Nursery School will be closed as of the end of June. The Committee is deciding how best to use the space going forward. The possibility of renting the space to generate revenue is being considered. Outstanding maintenance issues at the Brick Manse are being addressed; our renters have signed the lease for another year.

Finance: Overall the Church finances are in very good shape. The loss incurred by the Nursery School is less than what was expected.

Stewardship: The campaign for next year is currently being worked on. Stay tuned for this year's stewardship theme!

Communion will be served on Sunday June 2nd. The next Session meeting will be on Tuesday, June 18, 2013 at 7pm.

Reverend Sweeney adjourned the meeting with prayer.

St. Mick?

How many of us worry—worry about money, worry about our children, worry about our aging parents, school, jobs, etc.? Some people worry about making big enough strides in order to outrun their pasts, and others worry if they will be able to achieve goals in the future. Believe it or not, some of us even worry that we worry too much! Well, with summer coming on quickly and many of us making vacation plans and going our own ways, I want to leave you with a something to contemplate.

Mick Jagger, frontman for the band the Rolling Stones, sings these lyrics in one of the band's songs:

"You can't always get what you want, but if you try sometimes, well, you might find you get what you need."

Of course, Mick Jagger is no saint, but his words do echo a message that a carpenter's son from Galilee delivered 1,980 years ago. Read what's written in Matthew 6:25-34.

"Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? And can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life? And why do you worry about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed like one of these. But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which is alive today and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you—you of little faith? Therefore, do not worry, saying, 'What will we eat?' or 'What will we drink?' or 'What will we wear?'... and indeed your heavenly Father knows that you need all these things. But strive first for the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well. So do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today's trouble is enough for today."

Perhaps it was said a bit more succinctly by Mick, but he was hitting the same chord as Jesus, so to speak. Now, I'm not for a second going to entertain the thought that Mick Jagger had the words of Jesus on his mind when he and bandmate Keith Richards wrote "You Can't Always Get What You Want." But don't you think this is one of those basic truths in life? There are certain veracities that creep into our collective consciousness, facts of life that rise to the top of our awareness.

First of all, there's a difference between want and need, and as most of us know all too well, sometimes the things we want are not really what we need. However, when we are able to distinguish between the two, we begin to realize that we get exactly what we need in God's plan for us—even if we don't understand it at the time.

The belief that God will provide for us is a tough one to swallow for some folks because belief is not physical. You can't wrap your arms around it. But I would argue that faith is tangible. For example, when you have faith that your spouse loves you, isn't it something you can feel in your chest, in your whole being? When a dear friend of yours promises something to you, you know it, you bank on it.

With that in mind, I'm going to leave you with this assignment until autumn. Take a leap of faith this summer. Take a good, hard look at the things you need... not want. After this, do some reflection. Do you remember that old hymn, "What a friend we have in Jesus"? Let's try and cut down on our worries because our God, our most dear and loyal friend, Lord, and Savior, promises to take care of every one of us, day after day.

"Therefore, do not worry."

"You get what you need."



NANCY GOCKLEY HONORED BY HARDING TOWNSHIP HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Nancy Gockley is what is known as an "irresistible force" in support of both the Tunis-Ellicks house and the Harding Township Historical Society and she will be missed.

In furtherance of our charter to preserve the history of Harding Township, let me tell you a little about Nancy.

She has been at this "history stuff" for almost 40 years (far longer than most current board members and nearly as long as some board members have been alive!)

In 1974, she made a fateful decision to volunteer to serve on the "Bicentennial Committee."

She served under Cynthia Robinson and alongside the likes of Swiss Schroeder, Dick Lynch, and Walt and Marianne Morris.

Nancy remembers their fundraising strategy. They held a number of "Jersey Lightning" parties. They put together a common party plan and organized 24 parties including nearly 800 neighbors and raising a substantial amount of money (more about that later).

After the Bicentennial, Cynthia conceived of and drove the creation of the Tunis Ellicks Restoration Committee and the Harding Township Historical Society. Nancy went along, first as a restorer and then as a trustee of the Society.

The Restoration Committee led to the

Tunis-Ellicks restoration of the early '80s and included Dorothy Adey, Sue Mitchell, Betty Willey, Jack Fritts and our own Pat Burke. It disbanded after the restoration of the TE kitchen in about 1990.

About the kitchen... Nancy headed the Restoration Committee when its focus was the kitchen and is largely responsible for the discovery and reconstruction of the beehive oven, which is the kitchen's centerpiece. Working with Peggy Thompson, they broke through a later fireplace back wall and discovered remnants of the earlier fireplace with enough detail (curve of laid bricks and bake-oven) to enable reconstruction of what

had been there originally. This work was financed with leftover funds from the "Jersey Lightning" Bicentennial parties.

Nancy's tenure on the board has always been highlighted by a love for the Tunis-Ellicks House and its kitchen. She has done many of-the-period cooking demonstrations in that kitchen. As well, she was a strong contributor to our crafts sales and to the successful development of the Preview Party and Antiques Show and Sale.

On behalf of board and members, I would like to say a heartfelt thank you to Nancy for her service and for her love of the Tunis-Ellicks House and the Society. ~ Harding Township Historical Society Newsletter

Feedback Summary from Church Gatherings

Membership:

The consensus seems to be that we are a "graying" church that is not attracting the younger generations. There is a cultural change that is affecting membership and participation in programs. Younger families are over-committed and too busy. The result is poor attendance in worship, educational opportunities, and congregational life offerings.

With regard to children, it is particularly noticed in poor Sunday school attendance, the absence of a Children's Choir, and non-participation in youth activities in general.

Stewardship/Finance:

We are doing a pretty good job in the area of Stewardship. Members don't feel particularly pressured and like the low-key approach. In spite of that, however, there are those who are reluctant to pledge making it more difficult for the Finance Committee to develop a budget. It was suggested that the congregation needs to be updated more often as to our financial status throughout the year. People are quick to respond when there is a need, once it has been articulated.

Mission and Outreach:

15% of our operating budget is designated for missions. Approximately \$90,000 will be distributed to local, regional, and international missions in 2013. Recipients of these monies come under the close scrutiny of a very dedicated Mission and Outreach Committee. In addition, there are many opportunities for members to get directly involved in outreach: Kentucky Care, Soles for Souls, Christmas Is for Children, Community Soup Kitchen, All Hands on Deck, and Habitat for Humanity, to name a few.

There seems to be substantial interest in more hands-on mission projects. This is a multi-generational opportunity that might re-activate younger families.

Communicating with the congregation when there is a special need gets a quick and substantial response. Continuing to do the Minute for Mission every month is an important way to acquaint the members with the various missions we support. New members have been attracted to our church because of our focus on mission.

Music and Worship:

Most were very positive about the worship experience. The Moments of Celebration and Sharing the Peace have been well received and should be continued. Rick's worship leadership, sermons, and sense of humor were seen as positives. Most of the negatives centered around the music, both selections and performance. The lack of enough voices and difficulty of music for the choir were cited. Hymns that are unfamiliar, hard to sing, or with too many verses are unpopular. One person thinks that too much music is included in the service. More contemporary music is thought to be more attractive to the younger members than "ancient" selections. Others suggested that the service be ended on a positive, upbeat note with a livelier hymn selection.

Concerns were voiced over and over again about the lack of children in worship and the absence of young families in attendance. (continued on next page)

Special services like Maundy Thursday, for example, are not well attended. These services might attract people in the community if they were publicized more widely. The importance of attendance at and the significance of these services should be emphasized to the congregation.

The worship services are thought to be less formal and more relaxed than in the past, and that is seen as a positive.

Administration:

Debbie Hennessey, the Office Administrator, is seen as an asset as she interacts with members. She is viewed as helpful and accommodating. *The Pipe Organ* is also seen as a very comprehensive church publication.

It is thought that an ongoing effort should be made to update email addresses and keep the wesite upto-date, as well. Having *The Pipe Organ* available online is also seen as a positive.

Gordon's emails are good for announcements and reminders. Some members are still not receiving them, however, or don't know how to find them if they go to Spam.

It was suggested that when items like Christmas ornaments or CDs are offered for sale in *News and Notes*, those items (and money for making change) need to be available for purchase during Coffee Hour; a designated "go-to" person should be in charge of this.

Personnel:

Even though the Deacon Board is made up of members and not paid staff, this group is seen as a profound strength of our church. They are the ones "on the scene" quickly for anyone in need. Their tireless efforts are recognized, as are the contributions of particular individuals within that group.

Gordon's job description needs to be more comprehensive because he does many things in addition to Youth and Family ministry duties.

The Music Director received positive comments for his efforts to provide the congregation with quality anthems in spite of having a small number of voices with which to work. However, the selections were thought to be too difficult for a choir of this size and that more contemporary pieces are needed.

Rick was praised for his knowledge of the members and his engaging manner with everyone. Worshippers like his sense of humor and the jokes that open his sermons.

Amanda, the new church organist, is seen as a wonderful addition to our church staff.

Adult Education:

Very positive feelings about how the Adult Education program has evolved. There are two Bible studies that are fairly well attended. Also, members like the variety, the length and the value of the seminars held after Coffee Hour. It was indicated that more programs might be provided by members of the congregation who have special expertise. The time slot after Coffee Hour might also be an opportune time to conduct a youth activity and encourage families to participate in various educational offerings that run simultaneously. A variety of "off campus" field trips for adults have had light participation.

Feedback Summary from Church Gatherings ~ continued

Youth Education

This is by far the weakest area of our ministry. Children are in a spiritual vacuum. Young families are not attending worship services or bringing children to Sunday School. We have been unable to promote Vacation Bible School. This needs to be examined more closely. It may be a cultural trend or just apathy that is undermining our children's Christian Education. Some creative ideas were offered as a way of closing this gap.

Gordon has been unable to sustain a typical youth group. The exception to youth involvement was *All Hands on Deck* work projects. This is a strong indication that mission trips may be more attractive to this age group and ultimately give them a richer experience than regular youth group meetings. There is also an indication that their parents may be interested in the type of ministry/mission work where the whole family can participate together.

There is an inclination by some members to "look backward" when it comes to youth activities. A cultural shift is taking place in this age group as well. Because teens tend to be over-extended, short-term commitments that also help them accumulate community service credits toward graduation might be more appropriate.

Congregational Life:

It has been observed that, in spite of good planning and a variety of intergenerational events, attendance has been mediocre. This is especially true of evening events. The absence of young families at these events is notable. The lack of attendance is discouraging for this committee and its leadership.

Events planned that take place immediately following worship in conjunction with Coffee Hour are fairly well attended and enjoyed.

Personal phone calls to all families with young children failed to bring them out for a Christmas event to decorate cookies and meet Santa.

Buildings and Grounds:

A question was raised about using the library space in a different way or for a different purpose. There will also be vacant space on the lower level when the nursery school is finished. How best to use these spaces in the future is something to be considered.

Because of the historical significance of the sanctuary building, there may be opportunities to involve the community more with tours and educational events. This could ultimately generate funds for future restorations.

Nominating:

This past year the Committee had an easier time filling vacant Session and Deacon positions. We have a quality Session and Deacon Board as a result.


