Rick's Reflections

I think a lot about this part of the body of Christ. I think and pray that we as members of the body of Christ act in a way that gives credit to our Lord.

In cleaning out some old books, I came across a little monograph called *I Openers*. It's a collection of modern parables written by Herbert Brookering. Here are a few examples that got me thinking about our church.

Once there was a minister who wore a seed pod to church. Some people acted like they never saw it. One person couldn't stand it and she pointed to the dry boutonniere and shouted, "It's dead!" The minister walked around the church and gave everyone a piece. They all went home and planted it. That was all he had to say. They are still talking about it.

That story made me wonder if we need to be reminded that there is life in abundance ahead for our church. Even when it seems like something is dead, there is great life in it that is yet to be revealed. But it will only blossom when we are ready to accept change. Here is another parable.

Once there was a church that ran out of things to do. They had sung all the hymns and said all the prayers over and over. They knew all the festivals by heart and could recite psalms without looking or thinking. So they decided to celebrate the only thing left: Each other. Every week they celebrate one person. So many people are joining. It seems they'll never get done with what they're doing.

Do you think we could do that? It wouldn't be as if we were worshipping them. We would be worshipping God and thanking God for the gift of them. We could choose the names randomly so that nobody would be

offended. But we wouldn't stop until we had celebrated everyone in our church. Would you be OK with that? Would you be willing to try new things so that what seemed dead would live again? Might that be what it means to be the body of Christ, always rising from death to new life to celebrate each other in the name of the Risen Lord?

We have experienced low attendance and lack of participation in our Sunday School and youth programs in recent years, so before we begin the process of identifying a part-time youth director, we need to ensure we have a game plan and that all stakeholders have a chance to share their thoughts and ideas.

We have invited Ministry Architects to visit us on Saturday and Sunday, March 22-23, 2014. (Learn more about them at www.ymarchitects.com.) Ministry Architects will spend the majority of their time listening to a variety of groups within the Church through focused listening groups. We hope to see participation in those groups from a broad spectrum of parents, volunteers, staff, and people who just love our young people. We want your insights, your frustrations, and your dreams to be heard.

After spending all day Saturday in these listening groups, the Ministry Architects team will prepare a report, sharing with us what they've heard about the youth and children's ministries—including assets, challenges, and how we compare to children's ministries around the country—and where it seems that God might be taking us next. On Sunday, March 23, 2014, the report will be presented to the congregation, laying out specific recommendations and a blueprint for how to move forward. 



What's a Per Capita?



We Presbyterians are a connectional church. We are part of something bigger than just our congregation. We are a part of Newton Presbytery. We are part of the Synod of the Northeast, and we are part of the Presbyterian Church USA. Each of these bodies is involved in mission and ministry at home and abroad. Presbytery is not "Them". It is "Us".

Our local church is able to do our work because you the members support the Church financially. But the Presbytery does not have any

resources to do its work other than what the member churches provide. So the Presbytery and higher governing bodies depend on what we call a per capita assessment. Each church pays \$32.25 for each member. With that money, the Presbytery of Newton (us) and the Synod of the Northeast (us) and the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church USA (us) are all able to do what God is calling US to do.

In most churches, individual members are asked to pay their per capita fee separate from their pledge. In our church, this has not been the practice until recently. In the last two years, we have asked members to pay their own per capita. A few people have done so. If more of us would do that, we would accomplish two things. First, we would make a strong statement that we are part of something larger than just ourselves. We would affirm our tradition as Presbyterians by being connected to the greater church. Second, we would take some pressure off our budget. Right now, we pay our per capita assessment from the budget, presently \$13,222 a year.

So here is the request. Would you consider paying \$32.25 per member above your pledge to keep us connectional and help our church have more resources to carry out our own mission and ministry? I think that is worth 35 cents a day. If you are willing to do that, please send your check to the Church Office marked "per capita". It's an easy and meaningful way to help make our church stronger. Thank you.

Church Email Database

In 2009, the Church began using Vertical Response to send notices and announcements to our members. This service enabled us to send messages to all who had submitted their current email address to us and kept their address current.

In September, we noticed a change in our ability to reach many of the members. A review of the bounced emails showed that members with Verizon and AOL accounts were heavily impacted. Further investigation in early January revealed that these accounts had changed their security settings, and this resulted in our emails being blocked as spam.

Deb Hennessey has been in communication with Vertical Response to resolve this situation and has manually unblocked 68 email addresses that were no longer being reached by Vertical Response. To ensure that your email provider does not re-block emails from the Church, it would be helpful if you add officeadmin@pcnv.org to your contact list. This will prevent Verizon and AOL from automatically bouncing email that comes from our Vertical Response account. Also, if your email address has changed or you would like to be added to our mailing list, please send your current email address to Deb Hennessey at officeadmin@pcnv.org.

A View From the Front Pew

Recently, **The Upper Room** devotional booklet had a short essay that really rang true for me. It referenced a family who had moved many times. The following quote could describe many of us as well.

"When someone asks our sons where they are from, they have no quick and simple answer. This is because their father's career sent our family

packing every few years..."

The Sweeneys, like so many other families that we have known in the past and those that we know in our current congregation, have moved multiple times over the span of a career. The communities, homes, schools, and surroundings have varied. Local customs and traditions have varied as well. Becoming part of a congregation of believers has always made the transition to a new place smoother and less fearful for us. To quote again from **The Upper Room**, "The fellowship we find with God's people has given us stability, comfort, and security wherever we have lived." The common thread wherever we have gone has been Christian fellowship.

Few people these days spend their entire lives in one place. Rick and I often say that our children are "moving targets." When retirement finally comes, most of us would like to live near one of our children, but that could be anywhere. Their locations could change year-to-year. Even if we do manage to live in one place most of our lives, "we don't manage to live very long without enduring some major life changes and the stresses that come with them."

As a college student, away from home for the first time, I was very fortunate to have a roommate of the same faith. We found a welcoming congregation close to the campus and attended church regularly. We knew that, within that congregation, we had a "family" close by. When our children leave home, we need to encourage them to seek out a church as they move from place to place. If family is far away, they will have a faith community to lean on when (not if) a crisis comes or hardship overtakes them. As a parent, I am comforted by the thought that members of a faith community will be there for our children, if for some reason we cannot.

But how do we build that reliance on a faith community while our children are growing up? Bring them to church. Worship regularly as a family. Encourage them to get involved in age-appropriate activities offered by the Church and enroll them in Sunday School. Come to the Congregational Life events as a family. The annual church picnic and the fall Harvest Party are both family-oriented, fun–filled times, yet poorly attended by young adults and children. Teach them, by your participation, that church activities can be rewarding and fun. Build their fellowship base of other trusted adults on whom they can rely should the need arise. In doing so, you shore up your own fellowship base with people YOU can depend on. It is said that "no man is an island."

We all need the support systems that can be found in our church. It is more than a place to "hatch 'em, match 'em, and dispatch 'em." There is a lot of ground to cover in between those major life events and lots of places to stumble and get skinned knees. When we and our children are soundly rooted in a Christian community, there are many fellow believers who stand ready with the Band-Aids and a refreshing drink from the well of "living water."
