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Session Committees

We thought it might be helpful to list the committees of Session, to let you know what they do, and to give you the names of the chairs of each of these groups.

ADULT EDUCATION: Responsible for programs to instruct adults in faith and life application through Bible study, guest speakers, and discussion groups throughout the year. Chair: Nancy Barrett

YOUTH EDUCATION: Plans and monitors the Church's Confirmation class, Sunday School, and Youth Ministry. Chair: Kerra French

CONGREGATIONAL LIFE: An important part of the life of the church is fellowship. This group takes the lead in planning and supervising dinners, picnics, and special events throughout the year. Chair: Ann LaPré

FINANCE: Responsible for the formulation of a budget, the monitoring of income and spending, investments, and the reporting of the Church's financial status to Session and the congregation. The leader of this committee is the Treasurer. Interim Chair: Mike Phillips

STEWARDSHIP: Leads the campaign to interpret our mission as a church and encourages faithful giving by members of the congregation through the pledge process. Chair: Tom MacCowatt

ADMINISTRATION: Responsible for our insurance policies, use of building policies, office management, and phone and office equipment contracts, technology and other aspects of the administration of the Church. Chair: Larry Malm

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS: Care and maintenance of the church buildings and property, including the cemetery. Chair: Bret Fischer

MEMBERSHIP: Responsible for care of current members, recruitment of new members, and the keeping of an accurate roll of membership. Chair: Tom Ewig

MISSION AND OUTREACH: The Church accepts responsibility to care for those beyond our doors. This committee is responsible for the allocation of mission funds to organizations in our community and throughout the world. They are also involved in the interpretation of our mission to the congregation. Chair: Nancy Burrows

NOMINATING: Each year this committee is responsible for choosing candidates to serve as elders and deacons as well as other corporate officers for the Church. Chair: Jane Coyle

PERSONNEL: Responsible for hiring, monitoring, and evaluating the paid staff of the Church. Chair: Brenda Myers

WORSHIP AND MUSIC: The planning and monitoring of worship services, communion and baptisms, the choir and other musical programs in the Church are the responsibility of this group. Chair: Bonnie Gannon

The following are highlights from the February 21, 2012 Session Meeting.

The meeting began with Bonnie Gannon leading devotions. She read a piece about Faith from a daily devotional. This message reminds us that faith is like air, always there even if never seen.

Committee Highlights:

Adult Education: Naked Spirituality lead by Pastor Rick will start Sunday, February 26, and will continue for four sessions. The trip to see Godspell is set for April 14. Fifteen members are signed up to see a remake of this classic show!

The Congregational Meeting to receive the 2011 Annual Report & 2012 Budget will be held on March 4, 2012 following Sunday Service.

The Persistence of God

“What was that?” I asked.

“I said, if I didn’t know better, I’d say it looks like snow. Hi, I’m Vince,” said the unassuming character who sat next to me at the auto care shop.

Vince was fifty-eight years old, portly, with semi-long salt-and pepper hair, a moustache, and a beard. His plaid shirt, dark blue work pants, Carhartt jacket, and steel-toed boots told me he was used to the physical side of life, but he had a warm smile and a personable demeanour to him.

“Yep, the older I get, the more I can’t stand the cold,” he quipped. “I’ve broken more bones than I care to remember. I’ve fallen three times for a total of one hundred feet. The worst one was several years ago while I was huntin’ one day up behind my farm in Long Valley. I had forty-five acres of woods behind my home, and I set out before light for my favorite tree stand. I packed me a big lunch, but,” he said with a wink, “I ate it all before 6:00 in the morning. There was nothin’ much happenin’, so I set back to rest, and before I knew it, I was asleep. Now, I had a safety railing around my stand, which works, as long as you’re standin’, but I was sittin’ down, so the railing was above my head. Don’t you know? I fell off that stand while I was sleepin’... broke both of my arms in three places, broke my left femur, and suffered internal injuries. There was nobody around cuz I like to hunt alone, and nobody knew where I was or what I was doin’. I couldn’t move. I jus’ lay there wonderin’ what I was gonna do. The pain was bad, like nothin’ I’d ever had before.”

“What did you do? Did someone find you?” I asked?

“After layin’ there on the ground for what I guess was four hours, I heard a voice. God talked to me... said to use my cell phone. I didn’t do it. In fact, I argued with God for about six hours cuz I knew that phones don’t work up there. I can get reception at the end of my farm’s driveway, but that’s it. After, like I said, about six hours, it started to freezin’ rain, and it was starting to get dark, and God kept tellin’ me, “Use your phone. Use your phone.” He was persistent, so I decided I’d try it. Remember, both of my arms were broken in three places, and I hurt a lot, so it took me about an hour for me to move my arm to the point where I could reach my phone. You know what? It worked. I got through and got help. They ended up havin’ to airlift me outta there, but I don’t remember much after the call. Well, I gotta tell you. That phone never worked up there before my accident, and I’ve gone back a few times afterwards. There’s never any signal at all, but for some reason, it worked that day when God told me to call.”

“That’s an amazing story,” I said, now completely wrapped up in Vince’s tale. “Do you still have the farm?”

“No... I lost it. My farm was worth several million dollars, but I had too many bills. I went through a divorce six years ago, and I got diabetes and cancer. I was on chemo for 2 years – sick as a dog, and I couldn’t work. The government put liens on everything I had. I’m several million dollars in debt. I get all my food from food stamps and a soup kitchen. But I’ve had a good life. I’ve owned some amazing houses. I sold one of my homes to the King of Morocco. The same one just resold for nine million dollars. I was friends with Mike Tyson when he lived in Bernardsville. We’d walk into each other’s homes like we owned them. I knew Malcolm Forbes... used to ride my bike with him... and I’ve hunted big game all over the world, so I can’t complain. God’s been very good to me. I worship in a church in Sayreville. Love it. Wouldn’t trade it for anything. God saved my life once, so I want to praise him for as long as I live.”

With that, my car was ready. The oil was changed and the tires were rotated. As I stood at the counter, Vince got up and walked over to me and looked me in the eye. “Thanks for listening,” he said.

“No... thank you!” I responded. “You have strengthened my faith in God and mankind today. Some people would think you have every reason in the world to be angry at God and abandon him, but you didn’t.”

We shook hands, smiled, and I walked out to my car, thinking how much I have for which to be thankful. Most of the time, I don’t see it. I don’t realize it. I don’t think about it. Vince had reminded me that status quo isn’t permanent. There are no guarantees of anything except one thing. Wherever we are, whoever we are, God loves us and cares for us with persistence, and we should show him our love in return. That’s the most important thing we need to remember... ever.

Naked Spirituality ✧ Four-Part Series

Pastor Rick will lead a four-part Adult Education series on Brian McLaren's book, *Naked Spirituality*. The dates are February 26, March 11, 18, and 25. We will meet in the Library at 11:15.

McLaren investigates four stages of spirituality:

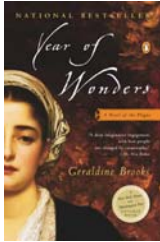
- I. FEBRUARY 26 **Simplicity:** The season of spiritual awakening. The main words that express this stage are HERE, THANKS, and O.
- II. MARCH 11 **Complexity:** The season of spiritual strengthening. The main words that express this stage are SORRY, HELP, and PLEASE.
- III. MARCH 18 **Perplexity:** The season of spiritual surviving. The main words that express this stage are WHEN, NO, and WHY.
- IV. MARCH 25 **Harmony:** The season of spiritual deepening. The main words that express this stage are BEHOLD, YES, and SILENCE.

As people and churches work through these stages, we can still echo the transforming power of Christ in the world. As with most things, these stages are not once and done, automatically moving on to the next stage. They cycle in our lives more than once.

We will explore these stages as we try to better understand our own spiritual journey without all the window dressing that sometimes obscures our vision. Please join us for this study.

REFLECTIONS OF A BEGINNER

It takes courage to come to a new church. If you've determined that it's the faith tradition you espouse and it's within the geographical range you allow, you try a worship service, maybe knowing a few but not many of the other attendees. Beside the basics of theology (yes, I believe what they do) and preaching (yes, I get something from every sermon to help me through the week), it's the church members who make the most difference. Are they committed to the church and to each other? How do they show that? Are they welcoming to newcomers? You've walked into their familiar circle. They have their habits and routines. How do you get acquainted? Making the church your own depends on having church members reach out to you.

Feeling welcome is essential. It doesn't matter what your age or whether you're shy or gregarious. New members want to learn about their new church. One can read pamphlets, but most of the education comes from other members. Asking where you live or about your family, stopping when you look lost, inviting you to fellowship or a seminar after worship, showing you where your name tag is, asking you to join a committee ~ all are ways to make a newbie feel at home. And, yes, introducing yourself again and again lessens the stress on someone like me who has trouble remembering names. I am very grateful to the many kind members of FPCNV who are helping me get acquainted with them and with MY new church.

March Outreach Focus: CE Solutions

Until recently, Carolina Amesquita, the principal at a school in Chimaltenango, Guatemala, lamented that her students were drinking contaminated water directly from the tap, often contracting gastrointestinal illnesses that kept them out of school. Juana Ramirez, a weaver in San Mateo, could no longer see well enough to sort her threads. Her productivity had plummeted, further stressing her already struggling family. While preparing meals over an open-pit fire in her home, Alva Rios was inhaling harmful smoke for hours each day. Julia Garcia was spending more and more of her family income on electricity bills, while Benito Ramirez had no electricity in his home and at night had to study by candlelight. Elsie Brito, a fourth grade student living in the highlands, had no access to books, computers or internet and thus her opportunities to learn and explore were at best extremely limited, and more than likely nonexistent.



These and similar problems confronting rural villagers in the developing world are being solved through the hard work of women with no entrepreneurial experience or start-up capital who receive support and training from a New Jersey based US Not For Profit called Community Enterprise Solutions (CE Solutions), an organization with its roots right here in New Vernon. Greg Van Kirk, whose family has been a member of the PCNV community since 1977, is the award winning co-founder of CE Solutions. Since day one, the PCNV Outreach Committee has played an integral role in CE Solutions' growth, providing designated financial support to CE Solutions' educational initiative, "El Centro Explorativo" (The Exploration Center).

Founded in 2004, **CE Solutions** is a social impact innovation incubator and implementation organization. CE Solutions was established with the goal of empowering business and educational entrepreneurs in developing countries to make a difference in their communities. CE Solutions identifies, trains, equips and supports individuals and organizations to provide sustainable solutions that address long-standing rural, economic, health and educational problems. CE Solutions strives to change "obstacles into opportunities" by converting traditional relief solutions into high-impact and locally-owned and managed social enterprises and institutions.

The Centro Explorativo, CE Solutions' educational initiative, is located in the town of La Pista, Nebaj in the western highlands of Guatemala. The Centro Explorativo provides first-time access to the tools and resources necessary for underserved children and youth in the Ixil Region to improve their educational opportunities, personal growth opportunities and critical thinking and to develop a love for learning and reading. What began as a closet-sized library with 100 books is now a full service education center with over 2,200 books and provides access to free computer and Internet classes. The Centro Explorativo has three main initiatives, as follows:



Centro Explorativo's Three Main Initiatives

LIBRARY RESOURCE CENTER

The library resource center provides tools for the youth of the Centro to feed their minds and their interests. It empowers youth by giving them the opportunity to explore the world beyond their own.

AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAM

This program teaches and reinforces basic skills (from reading to research to arts and crafts) through lessons that engage a child's imagination and creativity while also teaching effective problem solving.

COMPUTER/ INTERNET LITERACY PROGRAM

This program teaches basic computer and Internet skills. As the only computer and Internet center in town, the Centro is a vital resource to children as it closes the ever-widening information technology divide and allows them to fully explore and understand the world.
