Robert's Reflections

By the time you receive this newsletter, Yulia and I will be in Ukraine checking on *This Child Here*, meeting our staff people, talking with kids. There is always the routine anxiety of travel, but I'm feeling a little more anxious this time as the news is not good. A bitter war has consumed the east and could very easily move west. We departed February 23rd and will return March 13th, and I will be back in worship March 16th.

Why is it easier to start a non-profit, move to Ukraine, learn Russian, help street kids and orphans, and make such a difference in the lives of people in some distant part of the world than it is to grow a Presbyterian Church in rural or downtown America? Why do we more easily risk our lives with our market portfolios than we risk the responsibility of leadership as elders, deacons or committee chairpersons in a local congregation? I remember a friend who lived with his wife in an old row house in St Louis, the kind with ten-foot ceilings. He had a sticky note on the fridge. It read, "Janet, I love you enough to die for you, but not enough to go upstairs and get your coat." Why is it when a church burns to the ground, the congregation rallies, raises hundreds of thousands of dollars and builds a new one, yet congregations will do very little to stop their own steady decline?

If you believe in something strongly, you will give yourself fully to it, even with cost and danger. And the risk and the requirements of a great challenge can give us great energy and the courage to accomplish it. But if there is there is little risk or requirement, little gets done.

By the time you receive this newsletter, we will be in the season of Lent. The themes of Lent are: self-examination, sacrifice, courage, risk, danger, and the cross. By this time also, you will have seen the chancel area (or stage) where we worship in Fellowship Hall. It has been painted black. When David Mitchell first came to me with the idea, I thought it quite risky. Black? What could that look like but a dark hole? But after a few phone calls to dis-

cuss the idea with others, I agreed. To my surprise, it looks beautiful, and it is a beautiful idea. It's a blackboard. There is chalk in a box. We encourage you to write your prayers. I always tell people who find it difficult to pray: *Write your prayers.*

I know this sounds quite personal, but as Carl Rogers once said, "What's personal is also most universal." That makes it communal. This is a space in which we are invited to articulate what we care most about. It is a space in which we can say to each other what we say to God. Because it is a personal act, we encourage you to come to the church and write your prayers during the week. Every Sunday morning we will worship in sight of these prayers. Every Sunday after worship, all the boards will be erased in preparation for the week to come. Make it an every-week thing, come by the church, take some time in this sacred space to speak to God in prayer.

Session Committees

We thought it might be helpful to list the committees of Session, to let you know what they do, and to give you the names of the chairs of each of these groups.

ADMINISTRATION/COMMUNICATIONS: Responsible for our insurance policies, use of building policies, office management, and phone and office equipment contracts, technology and other aspects of the administration of the Church. Chair: Caroline Ford

ADULT EDUCATION: Responsible for programs to instruct adults in faith and life application through Bible study, guest speakers, and discussion groups throughout the year. Chair: David Mitchell

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS: Care and maintenance of the church buildings and property. Chair: Phil Van Kirk.

CONGREGATIONAL LIFE: Fellowship is an important part of the life of the Church. This group takes the lead in planning and supervising dinners, picnics, and special events throughout the year. Chair: Meg Richardson

FINANCE: Responsible for the formulation of a budget, the monitoring of income and spending, investments, and the reporting of the Church's financial status to Session and the congregation. The leader of this committee is the Treasurer. Chair: Keith Wood

MEMBERSHIP: Responsible for care of current members, recruitment of new members, and the keeping of an accurate roll of membership. Chair: Carol Conger-Vellekamp

MISSION AND OUTREACH: The Church accepts responsibility to care for those beyond our doors. This committee is responsible for the allocation of mission funds to organizations in our community and throughout the world. They are also involved in the interpretation of our mission to the congregation. Chair: Kathy Sheeleigh

NOMINATING: Each year this committee is responsible for choosing candidates to serve as elders and deacons as well as other corporate officers for the Church. Chair: Tom Ewig

PERSONNEL: Responsible for hiring, monitoring, and evaluating the paid staff of the Church. Chair: Todd Claytor

STEWARDSHIP: Leads the campaign to interpret our mission as a church and encourages faithful giving by members of the congregation through the pledge process. Chair: Jonathan Shelby

WORSHIP AND MUSIC: The planning and monitoring of worship services, communion and baptisms, the choir and other musical programs in the Church are the responsibility of this group. Chair: Tricia Tiensch

YOUTH EDUCATION: Plans and monitors the Church's Confirmation class, Sunday School, and Youth Ministry. Chair: Kerra French

The following highlights are from the February 10, 2015 Session Meeting. The meeting began with Jonathan Shelby leading devotions.

Committee Highlights

Adult Education: On March 1 Dana Gill, our guest preacher and Drew Seminary student, will give a talk on today's seminary students. Amaury Tañón-Santos will speak on Synod Life: Community, Networks and Mission on March 8. More films and activities are being planned for the spring.

Youth Education: The youth made brownies for "Souper" Bowl Sunday. Thanks to Suzanne Shelby who picked up balloons for the luncheon! Youth group assembled 22 Valentine packages and mailed them to our college kids. A women's pasta dinner to help connect mothers of young kids, was planned for 2/27.

Confirmation Class: Peter Travers, JD Grant, Lauren Shelby, and Kaitlin Bednarski.

Congregational Life: In conjunction with the youth club members, the committee provided a delicious lunch on "Souper" Bowl Sunday. There was soup, salad, bread, coffee and dessert. \$134 was collected for the Community Soup Kitchen.

Finance: The budget is balanced.

Buildings & Grounds: The Freeholders have agreed to fund church projects. Phase 2 of the Sanctuary project is full swing. We expect to be back in the sanctuary in April. There are a couple of organizations interested in renting the basement of Fellowship Hall, negotiations are underway.

Worship & Music: Ash Wednesday service is scheduled for February 19 at 7 pm. There are 2 guest preachers scheduled for March 1 and March 8 when Dr. Gamble will be in Ukraine. He will be back in the pulpit on March 15.

Mission & Outreach: Due to the treacherous winter weather, the social club dinner with Mental Health Association of Morris County had to be rescheduled; it will be held on April 28. The Christmas offering, earmarked for Doctors Without Borders, totaled \$5,134. All financial commitments for the second half of last year have been distributed.


THE BLACKBOARD

When you enter Fellowship Hall this month, you will see that the stage has been transformed into a giant blackboard. This is a special Lenten project in which the entire congregation and community can participate. For the next six weeks, we will use the blackboard to communicate to each other our prayers, hopes, fears, and joys. This might include personal, community-minded, or global concerns—it is entirely up to you. Here is what you need to do: At least once a week, come to Fellowship Hall. Sit for a minute and look at some of the prayer concerns of your fellow congregants. Then pick up a piece of chalk and write down some of your own concerns. Come as many times as you wish during each week. The walls will be wiped clean every Sunday afternoon so that we can begin each week with a "clean slate."

Why are we doing this? We are actively looking for ways to help the congregation be more connected. By taking each others' prayers into our minds and hearts, we are working to create a renewed source of spiritual power here at the crossroads. It is really important for everyone to participate! In honor of Lent, see if you can carve a few minutes out of each week for this project. (If you cannot make it to the Church or are concerned about your handwriting, leave your prayers in the Office and someone will write them on the wall for you.) Remember, your prayers count, and your witness to other people's prayers is equally important!



WHEN CAN WE EXPECT THE NEXT PERMANENT PASTOR?

These days, Interim/Transitional Pastors are staying at a church for a year-and-a-half to two years. I am told your last Interim/Transitional pastor served you for almost three years. Between now and the summer, a Mission Study team (appointed by the Session) will put together (with help from the congregation) the Mission Study Report. This must be approved by the Presbytery and will be the basis for a Ministry Information Form (MIF) completed by your Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) that I expect will be elected between Easter and the summer.

The Ministry Information Form goes out to pastors seeking calls to churches. It can be sent directly to pastors and will be available on the PCUSA website for pastors looking for churches. Pastors, in turn, provide a Personal/Pastor Information Form (PIF) in which they present their gifts, skills, and interests. Once you elect your PNC and they have completed the MIF, the Committee will begin the process of collecting PIFs: sorting, calling, and narrowing the search. Your PNC will have access to the forms of all pastors seeking a call.

If church life slows in the summer months, your PNC will meet weekly in the fall. They can expect to receive 50-100 PIFs from pastors seeking churches. They will have many letters or emails to send and sermons to listen to before they begin the process of interviews. By the beginning of 2016, I expect they will have a short list of potential candidates. Since pastors are often reluctant to move in the weeks prior to Easter, you may have a new pastor following Easter 2016, that spring or following summer.

This is a very rough picture of the work ahead. Your PNC must be prepared to have a short list of five to seven candidates only to find that some are not a good fit and others have already been called to churches. This doesn't mean starting over, but it can delay a decision three or more months. Don't settle for less than the right person for you. It is an important choice. Don't be eager to "get this search over with." Trust that God will provide.
