Robert's Reflections

Dear Friends,

A year comes to an end and a new one begins. This is the time to look back at the past and look forward to what lies ahead. Looking back may be difficult for some.

On the 4th of January we will have a worship service of closure. When a home is purchased, the term used is "a closing." Chapters of books come to a close. Doors close. You get the idea. But some things in life never seem to get resolved. Relationships end and people need closure; people change careers and need closure. People retire and can't seem to—they need closure. Tragedy comes our way, and we need closure. Think about where you need closure in your life. Some issues, events or times in life hang around for many years. In your bulletin that Sunday will be a piece of paper to write down a word, draw a picture or a symbol of the thing in your life that needs closure. Closure is a gift of God. I am going to offer you the opportunity to receive it. What you get out of worship, that Sunday will not depend on my sermon. It will depend upon what you write on that piece of paper, what you have the courage to write and the courage to admit to yourself and to God.

On the 18th of January we will have a worship service to remember our baptism. There are two sacraments in Protestant churches: baptism and communion. We celebrate communion once a month. In some churches, it is once a quarter; in others, every week. Baptism usually comes once in a lifetime, either as an infant or as an adult. Some churches immerse people in a pool of water, some have you stand while water is poured on you, and in others the minister cups the water with a hand and splash it on the head. There is a sacredness to these acts of ministry. We are blessed by them. We say that they are physical signs or expressions of the invisible grace of God. On the 18th we are not going to have a baptism; we are going to remember our baptism and be thankful.

Now and then, I get questions about what Yulia and I do

in Ukraine with *This Child Here*. After worship on January 25th, we will be giving a presentation on that work with video and slides. These are difficult times for Ukraine, economically, and politically. It is in every way a country that has been through one war and fears another, but we have never been more busy in our work there. Come see what life on and under the streets is like, what orphanages look like, what success looks like, and what joy looks like, in the eyes of a child.

This will be a two-week group project with participants having an opportunity to contribute research. We will consider such questions as:

Barbara Aspinall

What might Leonardo's purpose have been in creating this painting?

What, beyond the surface presentation, did he intend to portray? What theological assumptions and principles underlie the composition?

What did Leonardo's scientific interests contribute to the painting?

All women are welcome to join in this brief voyage of discovery into *The Last Supper*. Later in January, the focus will return to discussion of such large questions of faith, as "Why Worship?" and "What About Miracles?" These discussions are aided by a DVD series featuring Walter Wink, Frederick Buechner, John Spong, and Harold Kushner, among others.

The group meets on Monday mornings at 9:30 am and is led by the Rev. Barbara Aspinall.

Mission & Outreach: The Thanksgiving outreach effort was a great success. Many members gave generously. The next social for the Morris County Mental Health Association will be 1/27.

Everyone is welcome, and each person can contribute to the success of the evening in some special way.


OPPORTUNITIES TO PARTICIPATE

CONGREGATIONAL LIFE HOSTED THE 2014 CHRISTMAS DINNER







Mission Trip to Guatemala April 6-11, 2015

GREAT NEWS! Greg Van Kirk is helping us organize a trip to Guatemala to experience firsthand the efforts of Community Enterprise Solutions (CE Solutions). Greg is the founder of CE Solutions and a longtime member of our congregation. His remarkable organization has received financial and prayer support from us for many years. Greg will be presenting information about the trip during Adult Education on December 14. Plan to attend to learn more about this special trip

and the exciting works of CE.

Be the first to sign up to join the trip to Guatemala next year; from April 6 through 11th. Please note that it has been scheduled during the public school vacation so student congregation members can also participate.

The itinerary is being refined, but generally the plans are:

April 6 – Arrive in Antigua, get settled at hotel, meet our team leaders, and attend group orientation April 7 – Travel via microbus to Nebaj, stop at ruins and markets along the way April 8 & 9 – Work in Centro Explorativo, visit local church, and guided hike to explore area April 10 – Wrap up work project, reflect on our experience, and return to Antigua April 11 – Fly back to USA

Community Enterprise Solutions' motto, "Changing Obstacles into Opportunities," is based on the premise that it is only possible to truly improve the quality of life in developing countries when you create opportunities for residents to provide solutions for their communities. Handouts of donated materials, although well intentioned, are often neither effective nor sustainable. Community Enterprise Solutions works closely with residents to nurture initiatives that provide long-lasting and positive economic and health impacts.

We will be working at Centro Explorativo, where our congregations directs our funding. The Centro Explorativo educational initiative is located in La Pista, Nebaj in the western highlands of Guatemala. It provides first-time access to the tools and resources necessary for underserved children and youth in the Ixil Region to improve their educational opportunities, personal growth opportunities and critical thinking, and to develop a love for learning and reading. What began in 2003 as a closet-sized library with 100 books is now a full-service education center operating in the towns of Nebaj and La Pista. This center has over 2,200 books and provides access to free computer and Internet classes. The only institution of its kind in the region, it holds free after-school classes for children and employs three full-time teachers.


