Dear Friends,

It is still mid-November as I am composing an article for the December issue of *The Pipe*

Organ. It requires a sense of imagination to put myself in the middle of December, although maybe not that much as I was in the Short Hills Mall yesterday evening and already they have decorations going. Christmas cards and gifts on sale, and samples of tea and sweets, all to get you in the mood for joy to the world. I imagine what it will be like for families attempting to get ready for the holidays: for Christmas Eve when all must be well about the house, for family coming here, for those going to family. Christmas is never as perfect as it appears in the mall, no matter how it gets dressed up, and that's as it should be. Don't expect perfection; expect some raw edges. Expect the darkness as well as the light. You know it's coming. We all have unhappiness likely to unfold in this season to be jolly. For some of us, last year brought changes we were not prepared for. They can make the holidays almost unbearable. "I'm not celebrating Christmas," a friend said to me. For all of us, last year's news brought global changes few people were prepared for: the outbreak of Ebola, seven weeks of war between Israel and the Palestinians, the changing war in Syria, ISIS in Iraq, the Russian invasion of Ukraine. For many in our world, a celebration of Christmas will not be possible.

This is why we have Advent: to prepare—for all of it. Advent is the time of waiting, for ache as well as expectation. But Advent also says God is coming. We wait also for God, which requires a sense of imagination: God as a child into our humaness, God into this human mess. God's coming won't be all perfect either. You know the story. King Herod will try to kill the child. The wise men have to go home a different way. His birth is followed by the slaughter of the innocents. Even the date chosen for Christmas is based on the darkness of that day. Legend had it that kings and prophets died on the same date of the year as their conception. If you count nine months back from Christmas Eve, you pretty much arrive at Good Friday. Which is to say, Jesus was conceived on the same date as his death. So somewhere in the shadows of the stable was a cross. My hunch is we live in a culture that wills to hide that cross.

It is in that context I offer this story to take with you into Advent. It is told by William Muehl, a professor at Yale University. He and his wife attended the Christmas pageant at their son's school.

"The houselights dimmed, the school janitor sneaked on stage with a box of straw, and a purple spot focused erratically about halfway between the pillars of the proscenium arch. Then from the wings came three Virgin Marys, who arranged themselves coyly around the crèche and waved to their relatives in the audience. A vague uneasiness came over me. I feared for a moment that we were about to witness the promulgation of a new dogmagroup childbirth. But my wife, who is somewhat more sophisticated than I am in such matters, pointed out that the school had, over the course of the years, acquired three costumes for the Virgin Mary. So, by the strange logic which seems to govern pageants, there had to be three virgins. The virgins were closely followed by two Josephs, who took up sullen postures near the box of straw and stood their picking their noses. Next came the angels, about twenty little girls dressed in diaphanous white gowns and sporting immense gauze wings.

They deployed themselves with suspicious symmetry across the platform. Then the shepherds appeared, an equal number of small boys dressed in burlap sacks and clutching an assortment of saplings which purported to be crooks. At this point an unfortunate discovery came to light. In order to be sure that the angels and shepherds would strike a pleasantly balanced array on stage, the drama coach had made a series of chalk marks on the floor. A circle for each angel and a cross for each shepherd. She had urgently instructed the children that they were all to find and stand on appropriate symbols. But unwisely this marking had been done when the pupils were wearing their ordinary clothes, shorts, skirts, and overalls. When the angels came on in their flowing robes, each of them covered not only her own circle but the adjacent cross as well. The shepherds, driven by God knows what demonic impulse to indiscreet obedience, began looking for their places. Angels were treated as they have never been treated before. And at last one little boy, who had

suffered about all such nonsense that he could handle, turned toward the wings where the teacher in charge was going quietly mad and announced angrily, 'These damned angels are fouling up the whole show. They've hidden all the crosses!' Needless to say, his mother and I were greatly embarrassed."

The following highlights are from the November 18, 2014 Session meeting.

The meeting began with Jane Coyle leading devotions.

Committee Highlights

Adult Education: Unfortunately, Greg Porraro will not be able to do the presentation as planned on December 2. Monetary donations can be made, in lieu of goods, to Morris County Correctional Facility. The money will then be used to purchase items for the inmates. There will be a trip to the Metropolitan Museum of Art for a tapestry exhibit and Crusader Bible on Saturday, December 6.

Youth Education: The activities planned over the long weekend in November went very well. Five youth members made 50 breakfast-to-go bags. Three of our youth helped to paint several rooms at the Manse for the Gambles. The relief bus trip to Harlem, attended by five youth, was said to be "life changing" and extremely worthwhile. Another trip is under consideration in which adults may also participate. An Adirondacks Mission Trip is planned for July 5-11. If interested, contact Kerra French at kfrench@somersethillsymca.org. After the Christmas dinner on December 7, our youth members will be selling night lights made of colorful glass crafted by the autistic young adults from Kirkridge.

Cemetery: The grounds continue to be beautified and maintained; a large stump was recently removed. An interment in the memorial garden was conducted, over which Robert presided. There may be additional space available on the property bordering Glen Alpin Road.

Congregational Life: Remember to sign up for the Christmas dinner on December 7 at 5 pm in Fellowship Hall. It's a potluck dinner, so please indicate if you are bringing a main course, side dish, salad, or dessert.

Finance: The development of the 2015 budget is in the early stages. A couple of not-for-profit organizations have shown some interest in renting the basement space in Fellowship Hall.

Stewardship: Progress has been slow; please send in your pledges if you haven't already done so. There is a decrease in funds pledged through the loss of some members who have moved from area.

Administration/Communication: The website is still being developed.

Membership: There has been a decline in membership of 10 people, 4 of whom are deceased.

Mission & Outreach: The recipient of the Christmas Eve service offerings will be Doctors Without Borders. If you write a check, make sure to specify this on the memo line or it will go into the general fund. The next social for the Morris County Mental Health Association will be January 27. On December 14, Greg Van Kirk will present the itinerary for the mission trip to Guatemala, scheduled for April 6-11. The food drive for the Interfaith Food Pantry will be ongoing. The Prison Chaplaincy Christmas gift bag collection will continue through mid-December.

Nominating: The Committee is still contacting candidates to fill openings on Session and the Audit Committee.

Personnel: Dr. Gamble's terms of call do not have to be reaffirmed until 2015 as he started in October.

Worship and Music: Plans for Christmas are in the works. Send in a photo of yourself as a youth to David Mitchell via the Church Office. The décor for the Advent season will be simpler than usual, and the orientation of the chairs will change toward the front of the hall.

Communion will be served on Sunday, December 7. The next meeting of Session will be on Tuesday, December 16. Dr. Gamble adjourned the meeting with prayer.

CHRISTMAS OFFERING 2014



The Mission and Outreach Committee has selected Doctors Without Borders to receive your generous offerings from the two Christmas Eve services. It spite of the recent political and ethical concerns created by two of the organization's American volunteers, the humanitarian aid to save lives and ease the suffering of

people caught in acute crisis is tremendous. Doctors Without Borders/Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF) helps people worldwide where the need is greatest, delivering emergency medical aid in some 70 countries to people affected by conflict, epidemics, disasters, or exclusion from health care.

MSF provides assistance when catastrophic events—such as armed conflict, epidemics, malnutrition, or natural disasters—overwhelm local health systems. It also assists people who face discrimination or neglect from local healthcare systems. It is a neutral and impartial humanitarian organization that aims first and foremost to provide high-quality medical care to the people who need it the most.

MSF does not promote the agenda of any country, political party, or religious faith, and as such, endeavors to communicate its history,


background, and capabilities to all parties in a given situation so that it may gain the necessary access to populations in distress.

On any given day and in many locations worldwide, more than 30,000 doctors, nurses, logisticians, water-and-sanitation experts, administrators, and other qualified professionals provide medical care.

In 2012, MSF medical teams carried out more than 8.3 million outpatient consultations; delivered more than 185,000 babies; treated

more than 1.6 million people for malaria; treated nearly 350,000 severely and moderately malnourished children; provided some 284,000 people living with HIV/AIDS with antiretroviral therapy; conducted more than 78,000 surgeries, and vaccinated 690,000 against measles and 496,000 against meningitis.

Started by a group of French physicians in 1971, Doctors Without Borders is a large, international medical humanitarian organization, focused on providing care "to people whose survival is threatened by violence, neglect, or catastrophe."



This new brand of humanitarianism has reinvented the concept of emergency aid. MSF was created on the belief that all people have the right to medical care regardless of gender, race, religion, creed, or political affiliation, and that the needs of people outweigh respect for national boundaries.

Doctors Without Borders currently provides aid to such areas as:

- Liberia for assistance related to Ebola virus and other endemic/epidemic diseases;
- Central African Republic for assistance related to armed conflict, epidemics like malaria, access to health care, and natural disaster;
- Afghanistan for assistance related to armed conflict;
- South Sudan for assistance related to armed conflict, endemic/epidemic disease, and health care exclusion; and
- Democratic Republic of Congo for assistance related to armed conflict and natural disaster.

Both of these are candlelight services that will warm our hearts and help us all prepare to welcome the Christ Child into our lives.



Grand Design: Pieter Coecke van Aelst and Renaissance Tapestry



Although Pieter Cocke van Aelst is not as well known as Bruegel, The Metropolitan Museum of Art's sumptuous exhibition aims to change that. This show reveals why he was so highly regarded throughout Renaissance and 17th-century Europe. These tapestries were owned by the Holy Roman Emperor Charles V, France's King Francis I, and England's King Henry VIII, among others. Many of Coecke's paintings are included in the exhibit as well.

Much of his subject matter is Biblical. Among his tapestries are "God Accuses Adam and Eve after the Fall," "Seven Deadly Sins," and "The Conversion of Saul."

Mission Trip to Guatemala April 6-11, 2015

GREAT NEWS! Greg Van Kirk is helping us organize a trip to Guatemala to experience firsthand the efforts of Community Enterprise Solutions (CE Solutions). Greg is the founder of CE Solutions and a longtime member of our congregation. His remarkable organization has received financial and prayer support from us for many years. Greg will be presenting information about the trip during Adult Education on December 14. Plan to attend to learn more about this special trip

and the exciting works of CE.

Be the first to sign up to join the trip to Guatemala next year; from April 6 through 11th. Please note that it has been scheduled during the public school vacation so student congregation members can also participate.

The itinerary is being refined, but generally the plans are:

April 6 – Arrive in Antigua, get settled at hotel, meet our team leaders, and attend group orientation April 7 – Travel via microbus to Nebaj, stop at ruins and markets along the way April 8 & 9 – Work in Centro Explorativo, visit local church, and guided hike to explore area April 10 – Wrap up work project, reflect on our experience, and return to Antigua April 11 – Fly back to USA


Community Enterprise Solutions' motto, "Changing Obstacles into Opportunities," is based on the premise that it is only possible to truly improve the quality of life in developing countries when you create opportunities for residents to provide solutions for their communities. Handouts of donated materials, although well intentioned, are often neither effective nor sustainable. Community Enterprise Solutions works closely with residents to nurture initiatives that provide long-lasting and positive economic and health impacts.

We will be working at Centro Explorativo, where our congregations directs our funding. The Centro Explorativo educational initiative is located in La Pista, Nebaj in the western highlands of Guatemala. It provides first-time access to the tools and resources necessary for underserved children and youth in the Ixil Region to improve their educational opportunities, personal growth opportunities and critical thinking, and to develop a love for learning and reading. What began in 2003 as a closet-sized library with 100 books is now a full-service education center operating in the towns of Nebaj and La Pista. This center has over 2,200 books and provides access to free computer and Internet classes. The only institution of its kind in the region, it holds free after-school classes for children and employs three full-time teachers.

PIN Fund

The PIN Fund (Persons In Need) was created to help meet critical financial needs of members of our congregation and residents of the greater community.

Procedure:

A request for financial assistance is to be made through the Pastor and approved by the Pastor and one or more representatives from the Board of Deacons.

A voucher requiring two signatures (Pastor and Deacon representative) is then submitted to the Manager of Accounting for distribution of funds.

All requests are confidential.

Checks will be written to the creditor requiring payment—e.g., utility company, landlord, doctor, or medical institution—and never directly to the applicant.

THE PIN FUND IS SUPPORTED BY THE PRIVATE CONTRIBUTIONS OF OUR CONGREGATION

HERB Fund

The HERB Fund is an endowment fund established to provide grants to the greater community, not confined to members of the New Vernon Presbyterian Church, who are in need of financial assistance for college, graduate school, and other post-secondary education expenses.

This fund is under the stewardship of the Board of Deacons and is allocated at the discretion of the Pastor in consultation with one or more Deacons. The investment responsibility resides with Session.

Detailed information regarding the procedure process—such as deadline dates, grant criteria, and application forms—can be obtained through the Church Office and, in the future, from the website.
