Bill's Reflections

Just as a body, though one, has many parts, but all its many parts form one body, so it is with Christ. For we were all baptized by one Spirit so as to form one body—whether Jews or Gentiles, slave or free—and we were all given the one Spirit to drink. Even so the body is not made up of one part but of many.

1 Corinthians 12:12-14

Over the last few months, our church Session has devoted a part of each meeting to discuss the mission and vision of our congregation. To guide these discussions, we have looked at our core values and how the Church is working to implement them. I would like to begin sharing a bit about those discussions with all of you as we move forward, and to that end, will look at each of our core values one by one.

Missional

We seek to be a missional church. This means that we are intentional about nurturing community both within and beyond the walls of the Church. At the end of Matthew's gospel, Jesus leaves his disciples with a mandate: "Go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." This sending (missio in Latin) is a charge to share the good news of God with all people—regardless of age, social status, gender, or any other factor.

Theologians use lots of analogies to describe what the church is and does. Paul said it's the body of Christ. More recently, people have been lifting up the word community. Henri Nouwen writes: "Anyone can form a club; it takes grace, shared vision, and hard work to form a community. The Christian church was the first institution in history

to bring together on equal footing Jews and Gentiles, men and women, slaves and free."

The church as a community is substantially different from teams and clubs that we join. Like the church, teams and clubs are all driven by a common goal or interest. But unlike the church, clubs exist primarily to serve their members and often have requirements, qualifications, and fees needed for membership. Teams are organized to compete in a specific sport or event, where the best athletes get the top spots.

The church is a little different. We aren't a sports team, and we're not quite a club either. Anyone is welcome to come through our doors and become a part of our community. That presents us with both challenges and opportunities.

In Romans, Paul says, "for as in one body we have many members, and not all the members have the same function, so we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another. We have gifts that differ according to the grace given to us." Paul is appealing for unity. We hear him make this same plea to the Galatians and the Ephesians. Those churches faced division because of the numerous cultures and religious backgrounds their cities brought together, and one can't help but assume that this would have been even more of a challenge in the capital city of Rome.

But Paul's point here isn't just theological, it's pragmatic! We are called to live in a way that demonstrates to the world that unity is possible even as we celebrate the great diversity our church embodies. When we do this successfully our life as a congregation will flourish, and our impact on the surrounding community will be significant and meaningful.

FPCNV is already doing many things to build community here. Programs like Senior Lunch, Toddler Time, Movie Night, Bible Studies, and Men's Breakfast, for example, give people a chance to connect and build meaningful relationships.

We nurture community beyond the walls of the church through our partnership and support of local organizations like Dierdre's House, the Community Soup Kitchen, Homeless Solutions, Children on the Green, Cornerstone Family Programs, and more. Beyond supporting these organizations financially, we connect through hands-on service opportunities and more recently have been introducing opportunities for young people in the Church to connect and contribute to our mission partners.

I am grateful for the many ways that each person in our church family contributes to the FPCNV community. There is much to celebrate in what we have accomplished together. As we continue to journey through Lent, my prayer is that we will remember that God calls us to this different way of living. God binds us together as a special community, and calls all of us to be the north stars in our church family—loyal, dependable and, most of all, present. Present to what God is doing here and who God is calling us to be out there. Thanks be to God.

• Found an alternative company to test our water on a regular basis. Cancel McGowan. Should save about \$1,500 per year.

- Planning a phonathon for Thursday, April 4th at 7:00 pm. Members of session and the committee will call church members about Easter and Palm Sunday services.
- Having a luncheon for new members. Should have a dozen people coming in for next Inquirers class. Set up for Sunday, April 14th. Also one on May 12th.
- Bill and Hayley will be having monthly dinners to connect with new and current members.
- Hoping to have a great church picnic at the church this year on June 9th. Promoting turnout with another calling campaign on or about June 3rd.

Nathan Stucky: Farminary: Calling Stewards of the Earth



The Farminary Project at Princeton Theological Seminary integrates theological education with small-scale sustainable agriculture. Located at the Seminary's 21-acre farm, it is a garden of innovation and an incubator for leadership. Issues of agrarian thought and practice—ecology, sustainability, food justice—require our faithful attention as stewards of the earth and its bounty. **Nathan Stucky,** who serves as Director of the Project, grew up on a farm in Kansas where his love for agriculture first took root. He spent six years doing ecumenical youth ministry on the eastern shore of Maryland and two years farming back in Kansas. Nathan earned M.Div. and

Ph.D. degrees from Princeton Theological Seminary. His scholarship explores the integration of theological education and agrarianism, and he sees Farminary as a locus for enacting that integration.

Hugh Legat is a rising star of the British diplomatic service, serving at 10 Downing Street as a private secretary to the Prime Minister, Neville Chamberlain. Paul von Hartmann is on the staff of the German Foreign Office and secretly a member of the anti-Hitler resistance. The two men were friends at Oxford in the 1920s but have not been in contact since. Now, when

Hugh flies with Chamberlain from London to Munich and Hartmann travels on Hitler's train overnight from Berlin, their paths are set on a disastrous collision course. Once again, Robert Harris gives us actual events of historical importance--here are Hitler, Chamberlain, Mussolini, Daladier--at the heart of an electrifying, unputdownable novel.

Hymn of the Month

Lord, Who throughout These Forty Days

Author: Claudia F. I. Hernaman (1838-1898) First Published: The Child's Book of Praise (London, 1873)

As an expression of the teaching function of a hymn for children, this text is careful to draw parallels, especially between the forty days of Christ's Temptation and fast and the forty days of Lent. There are also a number of ways that his example should guide our actions: his fasting and prayer should lead us to mourn our sins and stay close to Christ; his struggle with and victory over Satan becomes a model for our perseverance and conquering of sin. Although the whole hymn is cast as a prayer addressed to Christ, the final two stanzas center on the petition for Christ to abide with us, not only in this season of penitence but throughout our lives. This theme is emphasized by the anadiplosis that connects the end of the third stanza with the beginning of the fourth.

Because this text rhymes only alternate lines (*abcb*), this hymn seems more spacious than it might if it had a more rigid rhyme scheme. The frequent use of monosyllables also helps to convey a sense of room for movement.

The present tune (St. Flavian) is based on the first

half of a CMD tune for Psalm 132. The original version used longer notes at the beginning and end, as well as several points in the middle. This evened-out version is largely the work of the identified 19th century harmonizer, whose chords were altered by the second edition of HA&M in 1875 and have remained so.

Lord, who through-out these forty days for us did fast and pray, teach us with you to mourn our sins and close by you to stay.

As you with Satan did contend and did the victory win, O give us strength to persevere, in you to conquer sin.

And through these days of penitence, and through this Passion tide, yes, evermore in life and death, O Lord, with us abide.

Abide with us, till when this life of suffering shall be past, an Easter of unending joy we may attain at last.
