### Third Place

To the Jews I became as a Jew, in order to win Jews. To those under the law I became as one under the law (though I myself am not under the law) so that I might win those under the law. To those outside the law I became as one outside the law (though I am not free from God's law but am under Christ's law) so that I might win those outside the law. To the weak I became weak, so that I might win the weak. I have become all things to all people, that I might by all means save some. I do it all for the sake of the gospel, so that I may share in its blessings. These words were written by the Apostle Paul in I Corinthians 9:20-23. They are about adaptability. Paul knew how to work within the cultures of the lands he traveled.

On the Starbucks website, I learned that, in 1983, Howard Schultz (Starbucks Chairman and CEO) traveled to Italy and became captivated by Italian coffee bars and the romance of the "coffee experience." He had a vision to bring back to the United States the Italian coffeehouse tradition: a place for conversation and a sense of community. From the beginning, Starbucks set out to be a different kind of company: one that not only celebrated coffee and its rich tradition, but that also brought a feeling of connection. He put it like this: First Place is home, Second Place is where you work, and Third Place, he hopes, will be his vast network of coffee shops. In many ways, it already is. Starbucks is a fixture in our culture.

In the past 15 years, I have spent much of my life in coffee shops, both here in the States and overseas. They contain a certain air of community: Do you have a plug for power anywhere? Are you guys online? Of course, people don't go there simply to access the Internet, they go there to meet. Even if their aim is to get coffee and go online, they want to be around others and not sitting alone at home. People feel strangely connected.

This is our culture. How do we adapt? Churches used to be that Third Place. Mainline churches used to have (and some still do) gymnasiums, pools, basketball, softball teams, Scout troops, and more. Now city

leagues and the YMCA offer all that. Churches used to be the place where people connected. Today, they come only on Sunday.

Some churches do have coffee shops. I'm not sure that's possible for us here in New Vernon, and I think there are other ways to draw people to us. How do you think we can celebrate the rich tradition of our faith in Jesus Christ and offer a place where people feel connected? How can the physical space of our church become a Third Place to our members and the people in our community? I would love to hear your thoughts.

### **Committee Highlights**

**Adult Education:** Julia Buteux will be the new chair. The Committee has some new and exciting ideas for how to include the community in our Adult Ed events.

**Youth Education:** Congratulations to Katherine Anne Newburg who was hired as our Sunday School Director. The new curriculum, *Faith Builders*, incorporates Faith + Bible + Legos. The three senior highs who went on the mission trip to the Adirondacks had a positive experience. A big thank-you goes to Don Richardson who led the group! The youth handed out water and healthy snacks to cyclists during a cycling event on Sunday, 9/20. In October, they will be going to Camp Johnsonburg for a high ropes course and zip-lining. The youth will also participate in the Hunger Walk on Sunday, October 18. Activities will be planned for the break in early November; the focus will be on helping local church families. Confirmation class will kick off in October.

**Cemetery:** The Committee does a monthly walk-through in order to keep the grounds well maintained. The Memorial Garden wall has been repaired, and trees were pruned to let in more light.





### The Sellout by Paul Beatty

A biting satire about a young man's isolated upbringing and the race trial that sends him to the Supreme Court, Paul Beatty's The Sellout showcases a comic genius at the top of his game. It challenges the sacred tenets of the United States Constitution, urban life, the

civil rights movement, the father-son relationship, and the holy grail of racial equality—the black Chinese restaurant.

Born in the "agrarian ghetto" of Dickens--on the southern outskirts of Los Angeles--the narrator of The Sellout resigns himself to the fate of lower-middle-class Californians: "I'd die in the same bedroom I'd grown up in, looking up at the cracks in the stucco ceiling that've been there since '68 quake." Raised by a single father, a controversial sociologist, he spent his childhood as the subject in racially charged psychological studies. He is led to believe that his father's pioneering work will result in a memoir that will solve his family's financial woes. But when his father is killed in a police shoot-out, he realizes there never was a memoir. All that's left is the bill for a drive-thru funeral.

Fuelled by this deceit and the general disrepair of his hometown, the narrator sets out to right another wrong:



## **Pastor Nominating Committee Update**

The Session of the First Presbyterian Church of New Vernon called a Congregational Meeting on Sunday, September 13, for the congregation to elect the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC). The Committee that was duly elected consists of Don Richardson as Moderator, Eileen McDonald as Vice-Moderator, Jen McCann as Secretary, Carol Conger Vellekamp, Tom Ewig, Jonathan Shelby, and Keith Wood.

The PNC held their kickoff meeting on Wednesday, September 24. Present at that meeting was the Presbytery of Newton's Committee on Ministry (COM) liaison, Mickey McDonnell, who laid out the process and the steps that come next in calling our next pastor. He will be our Presbytery liaison and guide us through the pastor search process.

We are now in Phase I, which will consist of the completion of a Mission Information Form (MIF) based on the findings from the Church-wide Mission Study which was completed over the summer months and approved by the Presbytery. The MIF will capture key information about who we are and what we are looking for in a pastor. Upon completion of the MIF by the PNC, the session will approve this important instrument used in the search process. This phase generally lasts for approximately two months.

Phase II will involve the fielding of pastor candidate inquiries upon review of our MIF, and it is then that candidates begin submitting their information for consideration. This phase may last for three to four months, depending on the pool of candidates.

Phase III involves interviewing candidates and the final steps which includes choosing a candidate and extending a call to our next pastor. This phase may last several months, with the overall search process typically taking 9 to 12 months.

This is a time of infinite possibility and steadfast hope as we together embrace the future of our Church. Your PNC asks for your prayers for wisdom and discernment, as we ask for your patience and encouragement.

## A Brief History of Sacred Music (part one)

Every week, churches around the world come together to worship and praise God. At the forefront of these meetings is music. I was once told that, "A church's choir is like its business card." And indeed, for better or for worse, it is often the first thing a newcomer will see and hear upon entering the church. Music is undeniably an important part of worship, but where did it begin?

In the early Middle Ages, Pope Gregory I decided that a few changes needed to be made to the Roman rite of worship, and he is largely

credited with what we know as Gregorian Chant or plainsong. (Although not the only contributor to music in worship, he was known as the "Father of Christian Worship.") Chant is monophonic—everyone sings on the same pitch, there is no accompaniment, and the rhythm is usually quite free.

Back then, almost everything was learned by rote, or ear, so aligning important texts with tunes was most effective in memorizing the teachings of Christ. It is easy to see how effective music could be in a populace largely illiterate, uneducated in philosophy or theology, and that worshiped in a language other than their own vernacular.

Today, worship is different. We can read the scripture and open the hymnal to four-part harmony. Many of us have multiple degrees, and even if we don't, the teachings of the early Christians, church fathers, or modern theologians are a mere click away online. Music continues to play an important role in worship. Lorenzo Candelaria, Professor of Music History at the University of Texas, El Paso, says, "praying through music allows us to express our highest calling—to come together as a community to worship and praise God—in a way that no other art can...This is particularly true of singing—an art that invites group participation and can often arise spontaneously around a shared sentiment and a decent tune. Singing is a natural response in times of joy or mourning, stress or relaxation—even in times of sheer boredom. It is universally accessible in that—all aesthetic judgements aside—if you can talk, you can sing. In the most general sense, we might think of singing merely as heightened speech: an inflection here, a thoughtful pause there, a lilting cadence to accentuate related ideas...heightened speech is transformed into song."

So, next time you leave church with a hymn stuck in your head, listen to it! Perhaps the Holy Spirit is trying to tell you something (such as, join the choir!). Submitted by Elena Bird Zolnick
