## Bill's Reflections



Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone...For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit. From 1 Corinthians 12

I thought of this passage from Paul's letter to the church in Corinth while admiring a mural that the young people in our church created during Advent and Christmas. It will be on display in Chorba Hall through February, and I encourage you to make a point of seeing it and sharing your feedback with our Sunday school teachers and students.

This mural has something to teach us about our ministry as a church family. This was not a project that was completed in one morning. Our young people worked on these six posters for over a month and a half. Some sections are brightly colored and exciting, while others are more subdued. Parts of the mural are completely colored in, while others still have a lot of space waiting to be filled.



# Sunday Speaker Series 2017-2018 11:15 am to 12:15 pm

RUSSIA February 11 Michael Reynolds

Michael A. Reynolds, Associate Professor of Near Eastern Studies at Princeton, will consider current American-Russian relations: What is it both sides want, what are the obstacles to achieving a mutually acceptable arrangement, and can any such arrangement last? He is the author of *Shattering Empires: The Clash and Collapse of the Ottoman and Russian Empires*, a winner of the American Historical Association's George Louis Beer Prize, *Choice's* outstanding academic title, and the *Financial Times* summer book list title. Dr. Reynolds, a senior fellow at the Foreign Policy Research Institute, holds a B.A. in Government and Slavic Languages from Harvard, an M.A. in Political Science from Columbia, and a Ph.D. in Near Eastern Studies from Princeton.





# THE HEROIN AND OPIATE EPIDEMIC IN MORRIS COUNTY Brad Seabury

April 22

Morris County Chief Assistant Prosecutor Brad Seabury will bring 12 years of experience in the Special Operations Division to share facts about the opiate epidemic in Morris County and what is being done to help individuals and families. Mr. Seabury will detail the latest national and local statistics and delve into how illicit drugs are distributed and sold here in the United States where approximately 80 percent of the world's opioids are consumed. He will also

describe how addiction can start and ways to combat it. Although realizing that addiction is a disease, he understands that the stigma of addiction makes getting help difficult. Representatives from the Center for Addiction Recovery Education & Success (CARES) will be on hand to provide advice to families who have been touched by addiction.

Born in Jackson, Mississippi to immigrants from Taiwan, he is an ordained United Methodist Minister and serves as a Minister-in-Residence at Church of the Village in Manhattan. With a Masters in Divinity from Emory University and a Ph.D. from Vanderbilt, Dr. Liu has taught and ministered throughout the U.S. and Europe.

# Hymn of the Month

# What a Fellowship, What a Joy Divine Leaning on the Everlasting Arms

Author: Stanzas, Elisha A. Hoffman (1839-1929); ref. Anthony J. Showalter (1854-1924)

The creation of this text began with the refrain. In 1887 A.J. Showalter, who conducted singing schools in many southern states, received a letter in Hartselle, Carolina, both of whom had buried their wives on the same day. In his condolence letter to them, he quoted a phrase from Deuteronomy 33:27 (in the KJV wording): "Underneath are the everlasting arms." As someone who created and taught religious song, he naturally felt that these words needed to be sung, so he fashioned the words and music of the refrain. He sent what he had done to his friend Hoffman in Ohio, who returned the three stanzas. (Showalter's account is quoted in Hofstetler 1949, 280-81.)

In classic gospel-song style, the second and fourth lines of the stanza anticipate the final line of the refrain, with the result that only two rhymed lines are required for each stanza. They all use simple and easily remembered exact rhymes for their endings, and their beginnings are organized around familiar formulas: "what a" (four times); "O how" (twice); "what have I" / "I have."

Showalter then completed the hymn by constructing the music for the stanzas. The music of the refrain was written first. With that information, it becomes apparent that the stanzas have been shaped with the same patterns of I, IV, and V chords and that the final two measures of the stanzas are identical to the final two measures of the refrain. There are also significant structural similarities. Both the stanzas and the Alabama, from two former students in South refrain are constructed of two four-measure units that repeat: ABAB'CB"CB'.

> The melody is hexatonic (omitting the fourth degree) and relatively compact in its range of a sixth. An even more uniting factor here is the rhythm, especially the prominence of dotted eighth-sixteenth figures. The stanzas appear on the third beat of every measure except those that contain half cadences and authentic cadences. In the refrain they are comparably frequent but have migrated to the second beat of the tenor and bass parts.

Because the rhythmic patterns of this hymn are so intrinsic and expected, singing in parts is essential (especially in the refrain). In setting the tempo, the accompanist will need to take the pacing of the supporting parts into account.
