Bill's Reflections

Those of you who read last month's Pipe Organ will know that our session is looking at how we can ensure that the growth we're seeing in our children's ministry can be sustainable.

At our last session meeting the elders agreed unanimously that the church will add a new member of staff to focus specifically on our ministry to youth and families.

We are really excited about this possibility and what the future holds for our church. But I've noticed that there is also anxiety, most of which comes from questions about technical challenges, the biggest of which is: "How are we going to pay for this?"

As a session we are working very hard to hold these technical questions in balance with the bigger adaptive questions of what kind of church we want to be and what we want our ministry to children and families to look like. The language leadership gurus use to describe this tension is change management. Whether or not you have heard this term before, we have all experience dealing with change (both good and bad) at home and at work.

For several years Hayley and I were the Co-Directors of a leadership program for young adults based in Washington DC. One of the books we would come back to again and again is called *The Practice of Adaptive Leadership* by two professors at Harvard's Kennedy School of Government.

It talks a lot about how people react to change, and lifts up some new ways of looking at the challenges change brings—the two biggest of which are anxiety and resistance.

One of their big insights is to divide challenges into two categories: **Technical and Adaptive.**

A technical challenge is one that can be solved with the knowledge of an expert. The problem is clear and the solution is easy (once you have someone with the right information). An example of this is the Internet goes out in your building. What do you do? Call the IT guy (your expert) who unplugs the router...plugs it back in...and fixes the problem.

Adaptive challenges are different. They can't simply be solved by a single leader or by pulling in an expert. Adaptive challenges require new learning, and they require everyone in the organization to participate in finding a solution.

An example of an adaptive challenge we see more and more of is merging two churches together. There is no easy or quick way to do that. The ministers of these two churches can't do it by themselves. You need everyone involved in the process. And unlike a technical challenge where the responsibility for finding a solution lies with the expert. In an adaptive challenge the burden of solving the problem lies with the people themselves.

The main thesis of the book is this: People and organizations fail to successfully handle challenges and change when they focus only on the technical at the expense of the adaptive issues. People get so caught up in problem solving and handling details that they aren't able to focus on the bigger questions of purpose and direction for their organization.

First discuss who you are and where you want to go, and then work out the details... That's a once sentence summary their advice.

And it echoes Jesus words to his disciples: "Do not forget who you are and whose you are!" Saint Paul says it another way in 2 Thessalonians: "Stand firm and hold fast!"

Here in the church we frequently face adaptive challenges and again its easy to get caught up in the technical, or to give into the anxiety that surrounds us in secular society.

Whatever the future holds for us—both as individuals and as a church—however uncertain it may seem to feel, the Bible reminds us again an again of God's prevenient grace. Any pathway, a pathway of joy, of confusion, of loss, or even of suffering leads not around but straight through God's grace.

God will always be with us - so that any ending is always and ultimately God's new beginning. May we always have the eyes to see and the ears to hear God already at work in our world!

October 15th Meeting



The meeting began with Rev. Stone leading devotions.

Pastor's Report:

- Allie Fritsch began work today as our new Office Administrator.
- Officiated at two weddings for the Rangers and the Shelby's.
- Four baptisms coming up.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Youth Education (Don Richardson)

 Looking to hire a Youth and Family Coordinator. It will be part time, about 24 hours a week. We would look for this person to network young families and coordinate the youth curriculum. Made a motion to explore the hiring of such a Coordinator part time and more details to be presented by the next Session meeting. This idea fits into the long term needs of our church to bring in young families and grow the congregation. MSC

Finance (Keith Wood):

- Moved to have a Congregational meeting on Nov. 3rd for presentation of NQ Deferred Compensation Plan for Bill Stone.
- Difficult to keep track of the numbers in recent months due to turnover in the church office. Cash seems a little low so Keith will move \$25k from savings to checking to be safe. Also available if necessary is up to \$50k loan from Crossroads. Balance sheet is in good shape.
- Announced the hiring of Brand K to be our bookkeeper going forward.
- Showed the cost savings from 2018 to 2019 of about \$16k from the office changes.
- Discussed budget process for 2020 and to alert committee chairs to prepare and submit their budget information for next year.

Buildings & Grounds (Tom Ewig):

- 2019 plans approximate \$15k, excluding HVAC for Sanctuary. Financing available from CIF (\$85k).
- Renovation of Sanctuary basement postponed.
- Presbytery nearing completion of those churches interested in pooling energy costs. Looks like about 16% savings may be possible. No other cost to us.
- We have been given the go ahead to the welding company to rebuild the back stairs for \$8,700. Will warranty their work for 25 years if we let them paint it properly every 5 years at about 10% of the price.
- Will have a meeting with Ludlow Co. to attend to air conditioning, humidifier in the sanctuary basement and heating there. Might be \$5,000 for the basement work.
- Paying Western \$1,000 to get rid of termites in the Sanctuary.

Membership (Scott Noyes):

- Ron and Renee Joelson are looking to join as they live nearby and their children are members. Moved to have them as new members. MSC
- Will organize another new members' get together.

Stewardship (Christin Willis):

- Has a new flyer to enclose in the church mailing.
- The speakers on Stewardship will begin this Sunday (with Christin herself).

New Business:

• A member is looking to organize another blood drive. Okay to allow them to proceed.

Youth Education (Don Richardson):

Presented a draft for the new job of Associate Minister who would focus on children and family ministry. This was put together by the Youth Ed Committee and opened for discussion. Session discussed several possible staffing solutions without coming to a clear consensus.

Motion was made to add an additional member of staff to lead the church's ministry to youth and families. *MSC*.

Finance (Keith Wood):

Presented preliminary budget review for 2020.

Reviewed the cost of the new personnel, Allie Fritsch and Brank K, versus our administrative costs in 2018 and estimated personnel expenses for 2019.

Building & Grounds (Tom Ewig):

Back stairs are being redone. New steps should be done tomorrow.

Still pending is the a/c and dehumidifying the sanctuary. Waiting for an estimate.

Tom is recommending increasing funding or a sinking fund for capital improvement.

Membership (Scott Noyes):

Presented a list of members who are no longer active, now Friends of the Church. They will be receiving a letter asking them if they wish to remain on the church rolls.

We have 15 new members to the church and just had a class of five members who may join soon. Gave charts showing the demographics are looking very positive for our church.

Nominating (Carol Conger)

Need two people from Session for the Nominating Committee. Martha and Christin volunteered.

Five from Session are rolling off the rolls: Jenn McCann, Eileen McDonald, Don Richardson, Jonathan, and Tom Ewig.

Stewardship (Christin Willis):

Have received 41 pledges so far which is 20% participation of the mailing. So far \$142k has been pledged, 41% to goal. Additional emails will be sent to those not yet pledged and a telephone effort in December.



Joel Farkas: Remembering the Revolutionary War: Our Collective Historical Memory November 10



Mark Twain once said, "Never let the truth get in the way of a good story." In this talk, we will look at iconic moments, events, and people from the American Revolution and see if our collective memory is: "the truth," "a good story," or "don't remember much at all." Some iconic moments we might "remember" are the Stamp Act, George Washington depicted Crossing the Delaware, the Declaration of Independence, and the Story of George and the Cherry Tree. Joel Farkas, a graduate of Ohio State University lectures widely on the Revolutionary War. A collector of historical autographs, he is a National Park Service volunteer docent at Washington's Headquarters in Morristown.

Dr. Douglas Simon: Climate Change and National Security

January 19

Climate change is an issue of national security not only for the United States but worldwide. We will discuss the issue from two perspectives: the first, how the U.S. military is engaged in significant planning for the impact of climate change; and second, a more global focus on climate "epicenters" as identified by the Center for Climate and Security. Dr. Simon is the only two-time recipient of Drew's Distinguished Teaching Award. He is the co-author of "The Challenge of Politics," now in its sixth edition, and of "New Thinking and Developments in International Politics." He has contributed to The Harvard Journal of World Affairs, East Asian Survey, Comparative Political



Studies, Perspectives on the Holocaust, and International Studies Notes.

Frank Pollaro: How Did a 12th Century Italian Mathematician Inspire a 21st Century Piano?

Learn the fascinating story of how The Fibonacci Piano, commissioned by Steinway & Sons, became, in their words, "feat of artistry, engineering, and precision." Frank Pollaro, President and CEO of Pollaro Custom Furniture in Hillside, will discuss his journey through the design and construction of this unique piano. Requiring over 6,000 man hours to complete, the Fibonacci was crafted from six different trees, inlaid in a complex and visually stunning pattern. Frank's passion for wood collection has continued for more than 30 years; he also actively preserves his craft

through teaching at leading furniture-making programs. In his personal time, he enjoys fishing, wine collecting, and spending time in their New Vernon garden with his family.

Matt Myers: The Art and Pleasures of Bee Keeping

March 22

Bees and their declining numbers worldwide have been very much in the news. This introduction to beekeeping covers the essentials to get involved in a lively hobby that has kept Matt Myers fascinated for 45 years. He will review how to purchase equipment and consider the components of a hive, followed by a look at the challenges of beekeeping in the northeast. When not tending hives, Matt has practiced as a criminal defense attorney for the last 30 years. He is confident no one will get stung but rather that some of us may get hooked!

Kevin Woyce: New Jersey State Parks

April 19



From Revolutionary War battlefields to abandoned forges and vanished canals, NJ's 28 state parks are filled with history. Discover the stories of our parks—who called them home, what happened in and around them, and how they have been preserved for generations of visitors. Kevin Woyce—author, photographer, and lecturer—specializes in NJ and NY regional history. He speaks frequently throughout the Garden State and has written and illustrated books on lighthouses, the Jersey Shore, bridges, and the Statue of Liberty.

Dear Partners in Hope,

I have the privilege of being the chaplain at the Morris County Correctional Facility. We would like to invite you and your church to assist in giving those who are incarcerated a sense of hope. As we prepare for our Christmas Celebration Program, your warmth is welcomed. The Christmas Gift Program has an overwhelming impact at the jail, and we would like to ask your church to join us in this program. Over the years, I have received many responses from the recipients who have expressed their sincere thanks to those who have made it happen. Providing these miraculous gifts is the result of the work of so many of you. The holidays are an especially busy time for staff and a difficult time for inmates and their families. All of us who serve this ministry know from experience that your generosity will truly touch the hearts of the men and women who are incarcerated at the Morris County Correctional Facility.

This year we will provide 250 inmates with gift bags made up of the following items (Please donate ONLY items on this list because jail security has approved only these items.) On some items, we like to provide two units for each inmate, which would mean, for example, 500 units of shampoo. This is no small undertaking. I believe that together we can provide the resources needed.

Men's white crew neck t-shirts, in Large, XL, 2X and 3X (no V-neck)
Men's white briefs
Men's white crew socks
Women's white sports bras (no wires or metal rings or hooks)
Women's white briefs
Toothpaste
Shampoo (medium to large sizes, no giant size, neutral fragrance)
Body Lotion (neutral fragrance)
Deodorant (neutral fragrance)
Bars of Soap, individually wrapped, regular or bath size

All items should be fragrance free or neutral fragrances, as the inmate population is approximately 90% male. Also, no pumps are allowed by the correctional facility.

We need all of the donations no later than Sunday, December 15, 2019. They can be delivered to the Morristown United Methodist Church. Please call the church a couple of days in advance to arrange for your delivery.

How to Read Literature Like a Professor by Thomas C. Foster

Who Would Think

Author: John Bell and Graham Maul First Published: *Heaven Shall Not Wait* 1987 Glasgow

This thought-provoking text comes from the first volume of the Iona Community's "Wild Goose Songs" (a term based on a Celtic image for the Holy Spirit). It appears here without changes.

Unlike most carols and hymns for Christmas, this text is not so interested in that narrative itself as in its meaning. In many ways the key phrase is in the refrain: "God surprises." The inadequacy of human comprehension is signaled through many related words: "Who would think," "watch...wonder," ... to confound all our human conjectures and anticipations.

When we recognize that we cannot find out God's ways on our own, then we can begin to appreciate the gracious transformation God offers us: "God surprises earth with heaven."

Who would think that what was needed To transform and save the earth Might not be a plan or army, Proud in purpose, proved in worth? Who would think, despite derision, That a child should lead the way? God surprises earth with heaven, Coming here on Christmas Day.

Shepherds watch and wise men wonder, Monarchs scorn and angels sing; Such a place as none would reckon Hosts a holy helpless thing; Stable beasts and by-passed strangers Watch a baby laid in hay: God surprises earth with heaven Coming here on Christmas Day.

Centuries of skill and science Span the past from which we move, Yet experience questions whether, With such progress, we improve. While the human lot we ponder, Lest our hopes and humor fray, God surprises earth with heaven Coming here on Christmas Day.
