Robert's Reflections

Dear Friends,

Many years ago, I asked a U.S. Coast Guard helicopter pilot, "What's it like doing search and rescue in a helicopter?" He replied, "It's hours of boredom, interrupted by moments of sheer fright." I suppose that could be said about many things and some careers. If you watch the "market," you might feel this way. I believe it is true of what we call spirituality, or our lives as lived "in Christ."

For a time in my ministry, I avoided the term "spirituality." I had concluded that those who claimed to be the most spiritual of Christians were actually the most defensive, reclusive, and judgmental. I did not want to be that way. Over time, I have come to see that spirituality does not mean defending the faith or God, as if God needs to be defended. It does not mean going off to a monastery. It does not mean knowing something everyone else does not know. It is not a feeling or an attitude that one is better than another, or more holy.

Spirituality is, first of all, participating in life. It is hearing, seeing, paying attention, remaining awake to what is happening and to what God may be doing—not in a sentimental way, or in such a way that we are always looking for miracles. It is accepting people and things as they are and believing that God comes to us in the life we are living, as tragic, terrifying, routine, or humdrum as it may get.

The word for "spirit" in both Hebrew and Greek is the same as the word for "breath." I've said this before: This is how people judged whether someone was alive or dead. Are they breathing? We talk about "inspiration" as a burst of energy or insight in our lives or work or writing or faith in God.

The life of a church could be likened to periods of routine (even boredom) interrupted by moments of sheer fright, or joy, or moments when you need to put energy into what you do and *really* pay attention. One of those times is coming. By now you know that your Pastor Nominating Committee has selected your next pastor. You will hear him preach on May 8th and vote as a congregation. He and his family will arrive after the end of summer. The great temptation is to think, *Well now we have a pastor coming who will take care of everything and bring some life back into this church.*

Actually, the reverse is true. Now we have a pastor and his family coming. We need to show them how much life we have in this church. That means being open, engaging, and non-judgmental. It means treating all with respect, accepting all as loved by God. Don't just look at your minister for inspiration. Inspire your minister. Be life-giving to the minister and his family. Churches don't just hire, they make great ministers and pastors. You want a good preacher? You have a good preacher coming. You can make him great.

Spirituality means knowing life is a gift. Live it with courage, with openness, with hope, with acceptance. Spirituality in the Christian context is knowing God is present in all things and times and places. That is the gift of the birth of God into this lovely and beautiful thing called human existence. God lived such a life in Jesus.

COMMITTEE HIGHLIGHTS

Adult Education (Julia Buteux)

- Jo-Renee Formicola spoke on April 10 on her most recent book, *Clerical Sexual Abuse:* How the Crisis Changed US Catholic Church-State Relations was publicized in the Madison Eagle newspaper.
- They will have the monthly speakers for all of next year by June 10 and publicize it in August.
- Sheeleigh House Tour rescheduled to May 15.
- Nutrition, parenting, and foreign policy are topics the Committee is looking to schedule.

Youth Education (Kerra French)

Finance (Keith Wood)

- The brick manse lease has been extended for two years to the current tenants.
- May 8 special meeting of the congregation to approve the Pastor Nominating Committee's recommendation for a new pastor.
- Terms of call for the new pastor were approved by Session, as recommended by the Finance Committee. *Motion moved*, seconded and carried.

Stewardship (Todd Claytor)

- Paypal or credit card on the website is costly: 2.5-3.0% give-up. Limit to spontaneous or special donations, not regular pledges.

April Highlights


